HOOVER AND LOWDEN GET 4 DELEGATES

ST. PAUL, Minn., Mar. 17.—(AP)—Two delegates instructed for Lowden and two for Hoover were named today as the first four of Minnesota's 22 delegates to the republican national convention.

Meanwhile county conventions throughout the state elected delegates to district conventions next Friday and the state convention Saturday with a majority of the instructed delegates pledged to Lowden.

Two Lowden delegates were named by the fourth district convention in St. Paul while the fifth district meeting in Minneapolis chose two delegates instructed to vote for the secretary of commerce for the republican presidential nomination.
