FLOYD YOUNG IS HERE; SEES NO DANGERS NOW

That harvester of good crops for the Rogue River valley and of discolored chickens, cats and dogs, closed windows during the night to prevent discoloration of curtains and other interior decorations, and like nuisances during the spring frost season period—Floyd D. Young, head of the government frost warning service in the northwest arrived in the city this morning, for his annual spring stay here.

In other words the official frost smudging season is on, and Mr. Young is here to do his part in insuring the harvesting of a year crop that will bring in hundreds of thousands of dollars next fall, by the insurance of timely smudging to the orchardists, as needed.

He recently closed his period of duty in the citrus belt of southern California, and hurried up north for a brief visit to the fruit belts in the state of Washington and at The Dalles, Or., to see after getting the frost warning stations there ready for duty, and when interviewed this forenoon had nothing to say about local conditions, as he had had no time yet to look over the situation here.

However, he stated that as he understood it there would be no danger of damaging frost here now, except at about 21 degrees. With his assistant, Mr. Rogers, who has been here since last week, Mr. Young planned to visit the orchards through the valley this afternoon on his first period of inspection.

The old frost gentleman was amiable, feeling good, and very glad to be back again in this valley of beauty and cold spring water. As usual, he will reside at the University club during his stay in the city. Mr. Young had been his resident co-worker here intimately, yet he misses his co-worker of years past until two years ago, C. C. Cate, former county agent for 10 years.

Speaking of the conditions in the citrus fruit belt of California, which passed thru quite a frost and smudging season, Mr. Young said that that state would have a large and profitable citrus crop, as little damage was done by frost and despite the fact that much damage was caused by blows on the orchards.

Mr. Young also stated that he was much pleased with the local outlook in preparations for combatting frost, especially the way the orchardists have set out their smudge pots and got their oil, kerosene and other fuel ready for emergencies. He stated that, never before has there been such general extensive preparations made by the orchardists for emergency smudging, as at the present time.
