### STATE CHAMBERS OF C TO OPPOSE \$3 LICENSE FEE

EUGENE, Ore., Mar. 21.—(AP)—With industrial development of the entire state as their principal subject for today, the eighth annual session of secretaries of chambers of commerce started at the University of Oregon today, under the auspices of the school of business administration.

Representatives from leading cities of every part of the state are present for the week's session.

Industrial development is making great strides in Oregon and every chamber of commerce is aiding in this movement, stated Eugene Chadwick of Eugene, chairman of the industrial development committee.

Expansion from within, as well as bringing in new industries, was recommended in the report.

Members of commerce should keep out of political controversies except when some situation arises that endangers the progress of the community, said L. K. Crumb of Bend, speaking on "The Chamber in Politics."

The present \$3 license fee movement was cited as a controversy in which chambers may take part as it was held that it would play havoc with the road program of the state.

Friendly relations with newspapers and newsmen should be fostered at all times, said W. E. Allen, dean of the University of Oregon school of journalism, in speaking on publicity for chambers of commerce.

Problems of Albany were discussed at the community clinic held in the afternoon under the direction of W. D. R. Dobson of Portland. T. A. Stevenson, manager of the Tacoma chamber of commerce, led by the group in technical problem discussions.

**REFUSES TO SHAKE HANDS WITH BILL**

CHICAGO, Mar. 21.—(AP)—The list of Mayor Thompson's enemies has been dramatically expanded to include William E. Dever, Thompson's immediate predecessor as mayor.

Both had gone to the funeral Saturday of Joseph F. Haas, county recorder.

As they met at the Haas home, the mayor made a gesture of friendship, extending his right hand to Dever.

"No, no," said Dever, "I would not shake hands with you. I wish you would offer me your hand at some place other than a funeral."

Flustered only for a moment, Mayor Thompson replied testily: "That goes double!"

**NOTED PIANIST TO WED GIRL ARTIST**

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., March 21.—(AP)—The romance of a noted pianist and composer and a Swedish poet, painter and music lover stood revealed today with announcement of the engagement of Percy Grainger to Miss Ella Viola Strom.

The romance began on a Pacific liner a year ago when the pianist was returning from his native Australia. He wrote in a letter asking Mr. and Mrs. F. E. Morse, his manager and secretary, to announce the engagement. It was prompted, he said, by a resemblance of Miss Strom to the family of his mother, since whose death in 1922 he has confessed to a feeling of loneliness and depression.

Mr. Grainger is 45 years old and has never married.

**COPCO REPORTS SHOW A PROFIT**

SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 21.—(AP) The California Oregon Power company, operating in Yreka, Dunsmuir and various northern California and Oregon towns, today reported to the California state railroad commission that its 1927 operating revenue was \$2,915,081, compared with \$2,491,065 in 1926. Operating expenses, excluding taxes for 1927, were \$4,004,956, leaving a net operating revenue of \$1,908,126 for the last year.

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### SENTENCE BOY TO BE BROTHER TO TWO ORPHANS

MUSKEGON, Mich., March 21.—(AP)—John Yokubones, 18, has discharged his first obligations under a sentence given him a few days ago by Probate Judge Ruth Thompson to serve as a "brother" to two small boys he made fatherless two weeks ago when his car struck and killed Floyd Torrey.

The youth, who works at a bench in a ship here, took several bundles, including toys, to the boys, Gene Torrey, 6, and Paulie Torrey, 3 years old, and promised to visit them again soon. He visited them at the home of their grandmother, Mrs. Jennie Torrey, with whom they are now making their home, and saw them for the first time.

He came away expressing a desire to "do all I can for them." The woman probate judge, who refused to permit prosecution of the youth, sentenced him to visit the fatherless children at least once every two weeks for two years and to spend at least \$400 of his earnings for their support during that period.

The unusual sentence is regarded as an experiment and is attracting widespread attention here.

**UNIVERSITY OF OREGON JUNIOR CAN'T BE FOUND**

PORTLAND, Ore., March 21.—(AP)—Searching parties were organizing this afternoon from Hood River and Cascade Locks to hunt for Robert Lemon, 22, University of Oregon junior and son of Mr. and Mrs. George H. Lemon, Portland, who has been missing since early Monday, when he took off for a hike into the Lemmon Plateau country.

According to Mrs. Lemon, who was advised that a preliminary search this morning under Forest Ranger Albert Wieseandanger disclosed no trace of the boy, he left his Portland home early Monday and placed his car in a garage at Cascade Locks.

Young Lemon donned boots and corduroys at Cascade Locks, took a light lunch and struck out, expecting to return last night.

Fear was held that he might be lost, as the plateau country is rugged and there is heavy snow in the higher ranges.

The boy's father went to Cascade Locks this afternoon to help with the hunt which is being directed by rangers, Cascade Locks residents and Hood River crag rats.

**NEW RADIO DEVICE TO AID AIRPLANE TRAVEL IS TRIED**

WASHINGTON, March 21.—(AP)—The latest aid to air navigation, a radio device to allow the pilot of an airplane to see whether he is on his course, was demonstrated today by the bureau of standards and William P. MacCracken, assistant secretary of commerce for aeronautics.

An airplane equipped with the mechanism was successfully flown at College Park, Md., near Washington, and the new device probably will be in air service regularly in the future.

While radio guidance for airplanes has been previously developed, the device tested today is completely encompassed in a dial on the instrument board of the flying machine. A pilot instead of listening intently through headphones for radio signals, will merely drop his eye from time to time on a pointer and by keeping it at a predetermined point, will know that he is on his proper course.

Signals from a radio beacon located anywhere within 100 miles of the moving plane will serve to guide the instrument.

The commerce department plans to establish a number of such beacon stations. Several are now in operation serving instruments of the older head type.
