WELL KNOWN ACTOR WHO APPEARED IN MEDFORD PASSES ON

NEW YORK, Mar. 22.—(AP)—Broadway today mourned Thomas A. Wise, shepherd of the Lamb club and one of the great character actors of the American stage. He died last night in a hotel, next door to the club of which he was head, from the effects of a bronchial and heart attack suffered Tuesday.

The 62-year-old actor had been in failing health for a year. A month ago he became ill while appearing in Chicago in "Behold This Dreamer," and returned to New York to recuperate.

He essayed many roles but is probably best remembered for his portrayal of Falstaff in "The Merry Wives of Windsor," and Senator William H. Langdon in "The Gentleman From Mississippi." A play of which he was co-author, "A Young Actor by the Name of Douglas Fairbanks" was a member of the cast of that play when it was first produced in New York in 1926. Wise toured the country in "The Old Soak," playing the part of Clem Hawley. He also made a two-year tour with Mrs. Minnie Maddern Fiske in "The Rivals."

He was born in Faversham, Kent, England, March 23, 1865, but was brought to this country at the age of three and began to earn his own living at the age of nine. His first appearance on the stage was in a variety show at Dixon, Cal., in April, 1883.

N. Y. SOCIETY LEADER MARRIES HER BUTLER

NEW YORK, Mar. 22.—(AP)—Mrs. J. Pierpont Edwards, wealthy 72-year-old widow, was married here two weeks ago to John Burden, 42, who had been her butler, but the news did not become public until today. Mrs. Edwards was the widow of a former United States consul general to Great Britain and is socially prominent. Burden served in the Black Watch of the British army during the World war.

Mrs. Edwards is an aunt of Larry and Monte Waterbury, leading polo players.

EUROPE MAY PUT U. S. AUTOMOBILES ON QUOTA BASIS

PARIS, Mar. 22.—(AP)—The Paris Herald today said a huge European automobile cartel is being organized to keep American makers out of the continental markets.

Italians are the prime movers in the project. They will broach it at a meeting of the leading automobile manufacturers of the world to be held in Paris in May. They will propose putting American cars on a quota basis in the European market and will ask American manufacturers who will be represented at the meeting to agree voluntarily to the proposal.

While experts in Paris are doubtful as to the feasibility of the plan, they see in the general movement a dangerous blow to American trade.

RADIO TO FEATURE U. OF OREGON BALL

One of the interesting features of the University of Oregon ball to be given at the Medford Hotel Friday evening will be a few minutes' radio program when the orchestra which will be playing for the university ball at the Multnomah Hotel in Portland, will broadcast, and the guests at university dances all over the state will listen in. The chairman of each committee will then wire to Portland, making it possible for the announcer to compare notes on the different balls being held simultaneously in the state.

The committee wishes to correct the announcement previously made, and states the ball here will be formal for women and semi-formal for men.

A few tickets will be on sale at the Medford Hotel until Friday noon, when the sale will close. The ball is not an invitation affair.

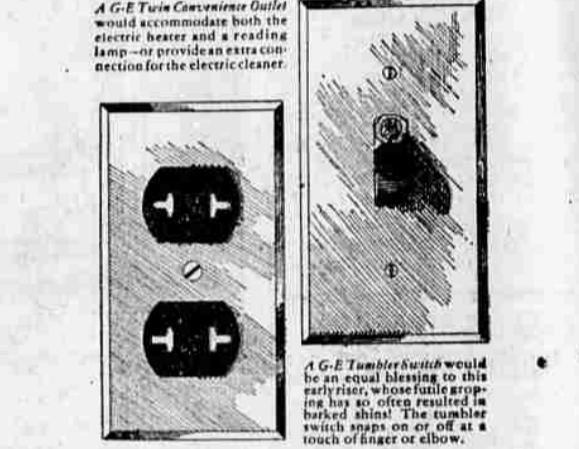
