SODA SPRINGS SCHOOL HEARING TO END TODAY

The suit of Al Rogers and other taxpayers against the school directors of the Soda Springs district to make permanent a temporary injunction against the construction of a play shed, at a cost approximating \$50,000, continued this morning in the circuit court, with W. L. Davis, a director, as the principal witness. It is expected that the case will be concluded late today, and turned over to Judge Thomas for decision.

The construction of the play shed has been a controversial point in the life of the district for months, and has raged furiously, with frequent recourses to legal action.

Davis testified to his understanding of the issue, and under cross-examination this morning, admonished his questioner, Attorney Gus Newbury, "Let's not get excited." Counsel advised the witness to follow his own advice, before the court interceded.

The residents of the district are about evenly divided, for and against the playshed construction.


