

SUPER-PLANE TO BE GIVEN LINDY ABOUT APRIL 1

NEW YORK, Mar. 22.—(AP)—A luxurious new airplane, with nickel-plated motor, self-starter and other conveniences, is being built in the Spirit of St. Louis will be ready for Colonel Charles L. Lindbergh by April 1st.

William Mankey, chief engineer for the Mahoney Aircraft company, builders of the Spirit of St. Louis, has divulged the details of the new plane, which was designed by the flying colonel himself.

It will have the same wing spread as his famous trans-Atlantic plane and something of the same appearance, but will differ in other details.

It will have accommodations for three passengers in addition to the pilot and will have a speed of 126 miles an hour. The interior finish will be the last word in airplane luxury. The seats will be deep-cushioned leather chairs and the instrument board will be of mahogany.

The nickel-plated motor is probably the most beautiful thing of its kind ever built. It is a Wright whirlwind of 220 horsepower and was the gift of its builders. Other parts of the plane were also gifts from their builders to Lindbergh.

Postpone Origin Clause

BOY IS INDICTED FOR BLOWING UP HIS STEPMOTHER

OREGON CITY, Ore., March 22.—(AP)—Earl Jones, 17, faced arraignment today on an indictment returned late yesterday charging him with first degree murder in connection with the explosion which killed his stepmother, Mrs. Inez L. Jones, and his half-brother, Harold. The indictment specifically charges murder of Mrs. Jones.

Robert B. Jones, the boy's father, in a Portland hospital with compound fracture of the left leg and other injuries suffered in the explosion, when informed of the charge against Earl, refused to believe the boy guilty. He was quoted as saying, "I would not believe it even if he confessed."

When informed of the indictment, Earl Jones said "That is just what I expected."

Tanker Goes Ashore
SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 22.—(AP)—The tanker Japan Arrow of the General Petroleum company went ashore today in Fuchow harbor, China, said a message received here by the San Francisco chamber of commerce marine department.

The vessel with a crew of fifty men left San Pedro February 26 for the Orient.

ALL-MEAT DIET PUTS PEP INTO MR. STEFANSSON

NEW YORK, Mar. 22.—(AP)—After three weeks on an all-meat diet, Vilhjalmur Stefansson, Arctic explorer, declares he feels more optimistic, ambitious and energetic and ascribes this to his dietary experiment.

When he started the experiment on February 25 he felt "lacking in pep" but now he feels "like jumping out of bed and getting right to work."

The test was conducted at Bellevue hospital under auspices of the Russell Sage foundation pathology department which has been studying diets since 1913. The foundation announced that the only conclusion it could draw at this time was that an all-meat diet was as satisfactory in New York as in the Arctic.

During seven of the 11 years he spent in the Arctic, Stefansson lived entirely on meat. Eskimos, who eat nothing but meat, never have scurvy and are in perfect health, he says.

Another Arctic explorer, Karlsten Anderson, on the all-meat diet since January 24, gained back during the latter part of the period a pound more than he lost in weight at first. Stefansson has lost about nine pounds, but explains that he was 10 pounds overweight anyway.

"I am convinced that the meat diet is an excellent one," Stefansson said, "but I would not recommend it for everyone. It would be too expensive. The meat of various kinds which I consume is equivalent to three sirloin steaks and might cost \$5 to \$6 a day at current restaurant prices."

SINCLAIR WILL BE TRIED ALONE ON APRIL FOURTH

WASHINGTON, Mar. 22.—(AP)—The conspiracy trial of John B. Fall and Harry F. Sinclair today was severed by Justice Jennings Bailey who ordered the wealthy oil operator tried alone on April 4.

Sinclair and the former secretary of the interior originally were scheduled to go on trial for a second time April 2, but counsel for Fall obtained a postponement on the ground that he was too ill to be present.

Government counsel immediately moved to have Sinclair tried separately and the motion was granted by Justice Bailey, who set the trial date immediately.

Counsel for Sinclair opposed the move to sever the case contending that Fall's testimony was necessary to the oil man's defense.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 22.—(AP)—The offer by Albert B. Fall to make a deposition and allow the trial of Harry F. Sinclair to get under way April 2 will be opposed by George P. Hoover, counsel for Sinclair.

"It would be difficult to examine Fall in advance of the trial," said Hoover, "and we will oppose such procedure. Besides not being inadvisable to examine Mr. Fall in advance of the government's presentation of its case, it would be impossible for us to do it now before April 2, the day set for the trial."

"If the court should sever the cases of Fall and Sinclair and then grant a continuance to Sinclair or continue the case against both of them, until the latter part of May or the first of June we would then be willing to go ahead with the trial of Sinclair alone and use Fall's deposition if he was unable to be present."

Arguments on Fall's motion to continue his trial because of ill health were called for before Justice Jennings Bailey in the District of Columbia supreme court this afternoon. If the motion is granted the government will ask that Sinclair be placed on trial alone April 2.

TWO KILLED, NINE INJURED BY GAS BLOWUP IN BAY

WASHINGTON, Mar. 22.—(AP)—Two enlisted men are dead, five are suffering from serious burns and four enlisted men and one chief warrant officer are suffering from minor burns as a result of a gasoline explosion yesterday aboard the destroyer tender Whitney at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.

The dead are William Melvin Delevett, seaman second class, of Baltimore, and George Edward Garrett, seaman first class, of Oarick, Mo.

Those seriously injured were John Frederick Neff, machinist's mate third class, Mount Royal, N. J.; Donald Leroy Burch, fireman third class, of Independence, Mo.; John Jay Easterling, seaman second class, of Stratman, Tex.; Guillermo DeHio, mess attendant of San Roque, Cavite, Philippine Islands; Willard Edmondson Janic, seaman second class, of Roanoke, Va.

Those who received minor burns were: William Albert Gardis, chief runner of I. J. Jerson, N. J.; Frank Benjamin Hulsander, seaman first class, of Chelmsford, Middlesex county, Mass.; Edward Peter Michalski, apprentice seaman, Baltimore, Md.; Howard Franklin Bousquet, seaman second class, of Island City, Union county, Ore.; Marvin Waters, Wexner, apprentice seaman, of Johnston, R. I.

The official dispatch from Vice Admiral Ashley Robertson, commander of the scouting fleet, said that the accident occurred at 3:49 a. m. on March 21, while the personnel were ventilating the cofferdam adjacent to the gasoline storage space.

The report said that the fumes were ignited from an undetermined source or cause.

The men who were seriously injured were transferred to the hospital ship Mercy where Delevett and Garrett died last night.

The men less seriously burned were kept on board the Whitney for treatment. There was no material damage to the vessel, the dispatch said.

A court of inquiry was ordered.

PORTLAND ARCHITECTS OPPOSE SALEM BLDG.

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 22.—(AP)—Carl Abrams, secretary of the state board of control, today received a letter from the Oregon Chapter, American Institute of Architects, asking for a conference with the state board some time next week relative to the location of the proposed new state office building.

Whether the conference will be held will be decided when Abrams confers with members of the board. The state supreme court recently held unconstitutional an act of the 1927 legislature authorizing the use of funds borrowed from the state industrial accident commission for construction of the building. This case is now on appeal to the United States supreme court.

The Oregon chapter of the American Institute of Architects, composed largely of Portland architects, objects strongly to the location proposed for the building, which is a vacant plot of state ground immediately north of the supreme court building.

SPAIN RETURNS TO LEAGUE OF NATIONS

GENEVA, Mar. 22.—(AP)—Official return of Spain to the League of Nations was announced this afternoon by Don Pedro Sangro, Spanish representative.

The announcement was made by Don Pedro at a session of the league committee on child welfare. He said that the decision to return was reached at a cabinet meeting in Madrid this morning.

INCOME TAX TOTAL TAKES 2ND JUMP

WASHINGTON, Mar. 22.—(AP)—Another jump in the rate of receipts from March 15 income tax collections was noted today in treasury figures.

To the close of business March 20 the payments had reached \$385,054,469 while for the same period last year the total was \$358,594,865.

Secretary Mellon holds the opinion that the estimates of the treasury as to government surplus will not need a revision, since some increased congressional appropriations are likely to offset the extra return from the income tax.

Though the treasury on March 26 took in \$87,000,000 and spent but \$11,000,000, its actual cash balance was lower at the end of the day than the day before because of the application of the receipts to the short time loans.

MELLON WON'T QUIT ANYWAY

WASHINGTON, Mar. 22.—(AP)—It was made clear today at the treasury that regardless of the result of the vote in the senate on the resolution to obtain his retirement from the cabinet, that Secretary Mellon would not resign.

It was evident in treasury circles that Mr. Mellon would ignore the attack upon him in congress unless President Coolidge should demand his withdrawal from office and no such action was considered possible. The resolution for the secretary's retirement, offered by Senator Couzens, republican, Michigan, arose partly from the Teapot Dome inquiry, and Mr. Mellon's failure to disclose that Will H. Hays, former republican national chairman, had offered him Sinclair Liberty bonds in exchange for a campaign contribution.

ASK ARREST OF VARE SUPPORTER

WASHINGTON, Mar. 22.—(AP)—A resolution directing the immediate arrest of Thomas W. Cunningham, republican, of Philadelphia, and a presidential pardon to the senator, known as Senator King, democrat, of Utah, today informed the committee.

Senator King presented a report today from the senate campaign funds committee, citing the refusal of Cunningham to tell the committee about his \$50,000 contribution to the campaign fund of William S. Vare. He said he would offer his resolution tomorrow directing arrest of Cunningham for contempt.

Cunningham is clerk of the quarter sessions court in Philadelphia at a salary of \$8,000 a year, and the investigators were unable to understand how he could have made such a contribution out of his own private funds.
