BEAVER CEMENT COMPANY OPENS ANOTHER QUARRY

GOLD HILL, Mar. 22.—The Beaver Portland Cement company is intending to open up a new quarry, situated about one mile up the hill from where the present quarry is located. The demand for lime rock has become so great that a new quarry is needed, and since the site where the future one is to be made was tested and proved to be valuable, the company is intending to open this place up. The cement business seems to be on the increase. The company has installed a new piece of machinery by which the cement can be loaded direct into the cars for shipping. This device does away with the sacking and loading of the cement when it is sacked, thereby making work much quicker and saving loss of both time and cement. This new equipment was necessary in order to fill their contract with the Portland Sea Wall builders, because the sea wall called for 100,000 barrels of cement and the cement as loaded by the former method could not be shipped fast enough, consequently they had to install devices which would fill their contract. There are 300 barrels of cement to a car, and only a few cars have been shipped. The cement business is one of southern Oregon's greatest industries and each day is progressing to make southern Oregon famous for "Beaver Brand Cement." The largest cement plant between Portland and San Francisco is situated in our city.
