

FALLING TREE KILLS ERNEST GIBSON, ASHLAND

ASHLAND, Mar. 23.—Ernest Gibson, son of J. R. Gibson who resides on Scenic drive, was instantly killed Wednesday afternoon near Klamath Falls. Mr. Gibson was riding in an automobile with fellow workmen when a tree fell across the road, striking the car

and crushing Mr. Gibson while the others, John Nelson and P. W. Snow, escaped with slight injuries. The men were traveling on a logging road leading from the Ewauna box company's camp near Klamath Falls. Mr. Gibson came to Ashland 35 years ago, when a child of 5 years, from Vancouver, Canada. He was employed much of the time in lumber camps. Besides the father, J. R. Gibson, two sisters and a brother survive.
