MARCH RAINFALL ABOVE AVERAGE

Twenty-nine hundredths of an inch more rain fell during the 24 hours ending at 5 a. m. today, more rain fell at intervals today, and unsettled weather with rain is predicted for tonight and Saturday, as well as continued mild temperatures.

So far this month the rainfall of 1.25 inches is above the average for March for the past 15 years, which is 1.18. The total rainfall since September 1st last is 11.84, and the total since January 1st last is 4.06.

NO FROST REPORTS FOR JOSEPHINE CO.

The Josephine county orchard district will not receive the daily spring frost forecasts issued in Medford by Floyd D. Young, head of the frost service in the northwest, as last spring. Mr. Young this week having so notified the orchard interests of the neighboring county.

In speaking of this matter and the explanation for the change, the Grants Pass Courier says:

"Announcement was made this morning that frost forecasts will not be available in this vicinity this spring. It is declared that the growers have not supported the work and that it has been found impossible to continue it. Because of the difference in distances between this city and Medford, it is said that frost warnings there will not give such indication of the weather to be expected here. The frost expert is now in Medford making arrangements for the frost work there."
