BEN SHELDON GIVES PORTLAND SOME AIR

Just as fast as he could relate it, Ben Sheldon of Medford began telling the news of the southern end of the state. "I am very fond of lying and have made many trips," said he, "but I didn't come north from Los Angeles in a plane. Medford will have to get a better landing field; it will have to buy an orchard adjacent to its present airport and get rid of the present muddy one now in use. The landing field will have to be long enough to get away from. There's a dandy field at Ashland and the town will capitalize it. Did you know that Bob Ruhl, editor of the Mail-Tribune, has contributed to the 'shame fund'?"

Bob sent Borah \$10 to help purge the republican party of the so-called stain it received when Sinclair contributed to the campaign fund of 1920. I think Borah is silly in this matter. When I arrived in Medford a few days ago I asked some men on the street who in the crowd intended voting for Smith, and you should have seen the hands go up. I can't understand how a state as dry as Oregon is can support Smith, and I inquired of many people for their explanation. There's an investigation of the prohibition funds in Jackson county. I don't know what it's all about, but Judge Charley Thomas has brought in B. L. Eddy, state senator from Roseburg, to make an investigation. That should indicate that there is something serious. I spend 40 per cent of my time in Medford and 60 per cent in Los Angeles. Down in Los Angeles they consider the newcomer as one of their most important assets. There are oil, manufacturing and newsmen, and the latter are placed first. These bring money. The tourist camp is considered as simply a forerunner of the newcomers. Compared to the way the town was four years ago Los Angeles is quiet. It is, in my opinion, overbuilt in office buildings and apartment houses. The swing now is to separate dwellings, the home taking precedence in building over apartment houses."
