TENGWALD TELLS KIWANIS ABOUT HIS FRISCO TRIP

A protected leprosy colony beneath San Francisco's Chinatown was one of the interesting facts learned by Carl Tengwald upon his trip to San Francisco last week, and brought out in an interesting and instructive talk given before the Kiwanis club this noon. The colony, which harbors only the Chinese afflicted of San Francisco, is the only leprosy colony in the United States. Its entrance is known only to the Chinese in that section of the city.

The Chinese telephone exchange was another unique feature of Chinatown visited by the local reporter, who took pains to study the system and gather data on its operation. The exchange is run by 30 employees, all belonging to the same tong. Twenty-four of these are Chinese girls who have memorized the 2500 names listed in the Chinese directory, the switchboard contains the 2500 plus, designating that many one-party lines, and the operators must remember the unlabeled plug for each name. The lines are not given numbers as is the case in the American exchanges.

Mr. Tengwald brought a few Chinese directories back to Medford, one of which he presented to President H. W. Hammond at today's meeting. Mr. Hammond promised to incorporate some of the new telephone directory, which is now being prepared in the Mail-Tribune printing office. It will be out the first of the month.
