### POPE PIUS AGAIN TAKES ISSUE WITH FASCIST GOV'T.

ROME, March 27.—(AP)—The address of Pope Pius criticizing the National Catholic Center party for its alleged slighting of its religious character in favor of closer co-operation with the Fascist government, was the main topic of discussion today in diplomatic as well as ecclesiastical and Roman political circles.

French Catholics were particularly puzzled in view of their forthcoming election on April 27, instructions from Cardinal Gasparri, papal secretary of state, enjoined them to support the re-

publican regime in power. The Italian Catholics, however, have just been rebuked for overzealous support of the Fascist regime.

True, there is no "Roman question" between the French state and the Vatican, as there is between the Vatican and the Italian state, but the laws of the French republic against teaching by religious congregations and other measures, it was believed, could hardly have the holy see's unqualified approval.

In the pope's address of Sunday to the diocesan board of Rome, one of the things to which he seemed particularly to object in the Fascist program was the bridging of the childhood and youth of the nation to be educated in strict Fascist style.

The pontiff asserted that the church alone was entrusted with the mission of Christian education and the formation of youth of the future.

This assertion was recognized by American Catholics as a simple re-affirmation of the church's policy regarding the necessity of the parochial school

system in the United States. The pope and the Italian ecclesiastical hierarchy for a long time have been showing signs of nervousness over the growth in popularity of the "Falita" and "Avanguardisti" organizations—the boys and youths of which wear the traditional black shirts, are trained by military methods and taught the Fascist doctrine that the individual exists for the state and not the state for the individual.

Although these two powerful bodies have their Catholic chaplains to care for the youth's spiritual welfare, there has been the latest fear all along that their influence might in the end draw Italian youth away from the influence of the church.
