

# CLAIM DENEEN FORCES BOMBED OWN PROPERTY

## Big Bill Thompson's Aide Explains Bombing as Part of Political Trick to discredit City Administration—More Violence Is Feared.

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The Swanson home is a block from the residence of George E. O. Johnson, United States district attorney, who said federal action would be taken in view of the government angle involved, the Deneen home being the official home of an officer of the United States.

State's Attorney General Oscar Carlstrom, who like the federal district attorney, is closely aligned with the Deneen group within the Republican party, was expected to institute an investigation of his own.

Chicago, Illinois law, Carlstrom has power to supersede the state's attorney, who is Robert E. Crowe, a leader in that Republican faction opposing the Deneen group. Judge Swanson and State's Attorney Crowe are seeking nomination for the office Crowe now holds. The election is two weeks from today.

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Two days later a bomb exploded at the apartment house home of Lawrence Cuno, personal secretary of State's Attorney Crowe.

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The new reward offer came just after George F. Q. Johnson, United States district attorney, had announced that the federal government was powerless to investigate the bombing outrages. The law made it strictly a matter for the state, he said, despite the fact that the Deneen home was the official residence of a senator.

# HIGH MARK FOR ATTENDANCE SET AT LEGION MEET

The American Legion meeting at the armory last night was a record breaker for attendance, with over 150 members present from all parts of the county. It was a snappy session with plenty of business and entertainment on the evening's program, and 11 m. rolled around before the meeting adjourned to enjoy the feed put on by the Ladies' Auxiliary in the armory mess hall.

Of chief interest to all was the announcement by Post Commander Bromley that the 1928 membership quota of 500 had been reached and passed, the present figure being 535. This announcement was greeted with cheers. The commander then called for volunteers to give two hours' time Wednesday morning to "mop up" and increase the figure to 600 by March 31, the final wind-up of the Medford-Roseburg contest. A fine response resulted from this appeal. He also requested that every member present do his bit during this final week of the contest to put Medford post over the top and assure a decisive victory over the "broccoli" buddies.

All indications point to a total of at least 600 members by Saturday night.

A report of the convention committee by Chairman Paul McDonald indicated that the business houses of Medford had given splendid support to the convention and that the budget was oversubscribed. "All details of the convention are making excellent progress," said McDonald, "and we are looking forward to the best state convention in history."

Seely Hall, state chairman of aerobatics, gave a fine talk on aviation and urged Medford post to help put over the improvement program planned for the local air port. He told of the splendid work which is being done by legion posts in Salem, Roseburg, Astoria and other points throughout the state to give their communities adequate landing fields and called for volunteers to meet at the Medford field Sunday morning to work on the local improvement program. A large number signified their intention of being present.

Commander Bromley announced the coming visit of National Commander Spafford on April 8, and stated that a big reception was planned for the legion chieftain in which all posts of southern Oregon and northern California would be invited to participate. The visit will be a signal honor for the local post, as this is Commander Spafford's first stop

on the coast, the trip being made by airplane from Reno, Nev., on his air tour of the country. A committee headed by Seely Hall and consisting of the past commanders of Medford post was appointed to make arrangements for the reception on April 8.

The Boy Scouts' leadership training course, which starts April 2, was announced by Scout Executive Belcher, who stressed the need of real men to head this worthy movement in behalf of the American boy.

Colonel Moshberger, member of the state aid commission, was called on for a few remarks, as was also Prof. Davis of the Spanish-American war legion.

An appeal for all legion men to register at once and to vote at the next election was made by Commander Bromley, who emphasized the need of awakening a new spirit of civic consciousness and of inspiring more citizens to take an active interest in the problems of government. "Vote as you please, but be sure to vote," was the admonition of the commander.

A valuable bid decorated with badges and insignia from the World War was presented to Medford post by County Health Nurse Lydia D. King, who served overseas as a Red Cross nurse, and who is now a member of the local post. This bid was made by Miss King from the badges given her by many wounded men who presented her with the insignia of their various outfits in the late war, being passing into the "great beyond." Miss King was called into the meeting and given a rising vote of thanks for this unique and valuable memento of the World War, which will be placed in the archives of Medford post.

A distinguished visitor at last night's meeting was "Prince" Gigolo of the Isle of Guano, who favored the post with an entertaining number in which he was ably assisted by D. A. Collier. The "prince," who in real life is Earle Davis, the popular announcer of station KMRD, brought down the house with his clever dialect. Collier also made a hit when he divulged many hitherto unknown facts about the personnel of Medford post.

Henry Fluhrer introduced Whit Barton's dance band which will play at the legion dance next Saturday night and the balance of the evening's program was taken up by these clever musicians, who put over their numbers in the show, generously responding to repeated encores.

Following the entertainment program a "feed" was enjoyed in the armory dining room, which was crowded to capacity to accommodate the large crowd of local and out-of-town legion and auxiliary members present.

There will be 12 miles in this project but it is not new work, the state having pledged last year.

# Wall Street Report

NEW YORK, Mar. 27.—(AP)—The stock market which has been establishing new altitude records almost daily for more than three weeks, went into a nose dive today as prices crashed 25 to nearly 50 shares in one of the wildest sessions in Wall street history.

Supporting orders were quickly supplied and about half the gains were recovered in a brisk rally around mid-day.

Trading was conducted at an unprecedented pace, more than 2,000,000 shares changing hands in the first two hours. With the ticker set at mid-day, there were strong indications that the day's total sales might cross the 5,000,000 share mark for the first time in history. The 4,900,000 share mark has been crossed only twice, the first time on March 22 and the second time in yesterday's record-breaking session of 4,176,200 shares.

The reaction in stock prices quickly had its influence on the price of New York stock exchange memberships, sale of a seat being arranged today at \$360,000, a drop of \$15,000 below the record price established yesterday.
