

OPERATION ON THROAT SAVES WOMAN'S LIFE

A rare and heroic surgical operation performed Sunday evening by Dr. J. J. Emmons, with Dr. James Hayes assisting, at Sacred Heart hospital, snatched Mrs. Ellis Stanfield from the jaws of death. Mrs. Stanfield, a woman of 25 years, was taken to the hospital suffering from throat trouble. The walls of the windpipe were compressed by a growth, making breathing extremely difficult and causing intense suffering. Sunday evening Dr. Emmons received a phone call saying that Mrs. Stanfield was near the end. Dr. Emmons rushed to her bedside and found her gasping feebly, circulation of the blood practically suspended, and just a trace of heart action. Without delay an incision was made in the chest, the trachea slit and a silver tube inserted. The entire procedure took less than a minute, and immediate results were obtained. Mrs. Stanfield breathed easier and near normal heart and blood action returned within 20 minutes. She had undergone a tracheotomy operation. Mrs. Stanfield yesterday was
