

SCHOOL CHILDREN OF COUNTY READY FOR HEALTH EXAMINATIONS

To be or not to be on the honor roll is the vital issue among the school children of the valley these days. It is the style to be on it, so human nature is turning the minds of children and their parents in the direction all stylish folks are taking. It will lead them eventually to the spring style show of good health and good scholarship which takes place May 1.

Children are eager for their physical examinations being made by members of the county medical society as arranged by the school management. Letters are being sent to parents telling of any defects which, if corrected or properly treated, do not hinder the child from being on the coveted honor roll.

A few of these children are indifferent at first, objecting to removing shoes when weighed or slipping their clothes half way down for a thorough examination by the doctors, so they are promptly excused to make room for the enthusiastic candidates. But when these victims of bashfulness or misunderstanding suddenly find they are out of style, back they come next day or next week pleading for a second chance.

Those youngsters, who revel in good health and such frisky spirits that their class conduct and lessons are near, must reform at once if they wish to make the health honor roll.

A child will be considered eligible for the honor roll if, after a physical examination by a physician, in the opinion of his teacher he is rated as:

- (1) Mentally normal; (2) Physically free from defects; (3) Reasonably cooperative in health and habits; (4) Satisfactory in his behavior and attitude in the school environment.

FROST PREDICTION FIRST OF SEASON, IS DUE TONIGHT

The first frost prediction of the season was received here this morning along with the regular daily forecast sent out by the San Francisco weather bureau, for tonight. This does not seem so alarming for the reason that today was mostly cloudy with heavy rain clouds in the offing, and the oration of Floyd Young, which will be given out to the telephone exchange about 7 p. m., and which will also be given by Mr. Young by radio to the Mail Tribune-Virgin station KMED at 7:15 p. m., before worrying.

However, the prediction from San Francisco is for fair weather tonight and Thursday. The rains ceased early yesterday forenoon and only .01 of an inch of rain fell during the 24 hours ending at 5 a. m. today. The highest temperature of yesterday was 52, and the lowest of today was 24.

PROGRAM FOR PRE-EASTER SERVICES IN CITY CHURCHES

Beginning next Sunday, April 1, the Baptist, Christian, Methodist and Presbyterian churches will hold pre-Easter services, to which they invite the interest of the public.

On Sunday the churches will have their regular services, but the ministers will use the same themes. Sunday night, 8 o'clock—"Today Shall Thou Be With Me in Paradise." It is a word of mercy. Theme, "Grace Without Limit."

Monday evening, 8 o'clock text—"Woman, Behold Thy Son and Behold Thy Mother." It is the constraint of mother love. Rev. T. H. Temple of the Methodist Church North will bring the message.

Tuesday night—"My God, My God, Why Hast Thou Forsaken Me?" It is a word of agony. Theme, "The Pure Sacrifice." Rev. E. P. Lawrence will be the speaker.

Wednesday night text—"I Thirst." Theme, "The Soul of Sympathy." Rev. T. H. Temple will be the speaker.

Thursday night text—"It Is Finished." Theme, "The Finished Life." Rev. Carmon E. Mell will bring the sermon.

Friday night text—"Into Thy Hands I Commit My Spirit." It is a word of sweet repose. Theme, "Stillness After the Storm." Rev. W. H. Eaton will speak on the theme.

All the week night services will be held in the Christian church with Rev. Carmon E. Mell in charge of the music. Special music will be furnished for each evening by the different churches.

Indicating an early settlement of the estate of George W. Barker, deceased president of the Pine Belt Banking company at Butte Falls, R. L. Hammond of this city was yesterday appointed the administrator of the estate and J. W. Wakefield, C. E. Pierce and C. A. Whitlock of this city, appraisers.

The estate consists of the "home" place in Butte Falls, lots four and five in block 26, with a rental value of approximately \$260 yearly; the sum of \$72.50 on deposit in the Butte Falls bank and 225 shares of stock in the banking company. The value of the shares are to be appraised in a short time. He also left a one-sixth interest in a city lot in Medford.

Mr. Barker left no will and the heirs are his wife, two daughters and a son. The oldest of the children is Eleanor, who is 13, followed by her sister who is 10. The boy is four years of age.
