The program for tomorrow night has not been definitely planned, but details are expected to be completed early tomorrow.

DEMOCRATS SCORED

ROSEBURG VOTES AIRPORT BONDS

ROSEBURG, Ore., Mar. 29.—649 Issuance of \$25,000 in bonds for the purchase and improvement of airport for Roseburg was authorized at a special city election held here yesterday. There were 1201 votes cast, the largest number ever polled at a special city election. \$14,000 will be used for the purchase of a 140 acre tract, one mile from the city limits, and the remainder will be used for improvements.

The four passenger B. monoplane, in which Tex Hankin of Portland will attempt to break the world's endurance record, left the Medford airport at 12:59 this afternoon for Portland, after having arrived here last evening from the Ryan airplane factory at San Diego piloted by Frank Adlerling. Noel Evans, business manager for the Sander aeronautical school of this city, left with the ship to obtain information on its operation inasmuch as the school is planning to purchase a similar plane this summer for long distance trips.

ASHLAND WOMAN MOULTON FILES EXTENDS GREETING TO STATE D. A. R. FOR PROSECUTOR

The long expected filing of Allison Moulton for the Republican nomination of district attorney for Jackson county, was filed today with the secretary of state's office at Salem making the second filing for the Republican nomination so far, as W. G. Trill, also of Medford, filed last Tuesday, and a third filing is expected, that of District Attorney N. C. Cheney, seeking re-election. Moulton has been strong for a long time past that George A. Coddling will file for the Democratic nomination.

Leazer and Bernard Orton of Ashland, who confessed yesterday to the loading of two freight cars at Ashland March 4, were each sentenced to two years in the state penitentiary when they entered pleas of guilty in the circuit court this forenoon. 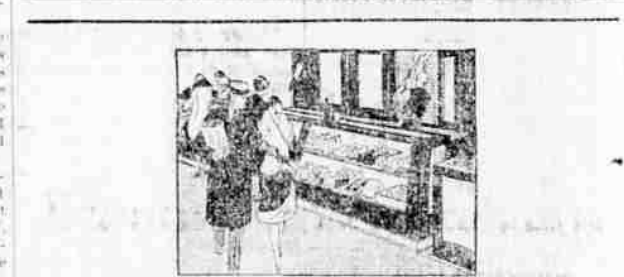

Blindfolded in scientific test of leading Cigarettes James Montgomery Flagg selects



Actual photograph of JAMES MONTGOMERY FLAGG, taken in his studio with test being made. How Test Was Made Subject was blindfolded, and, in the presence of two responsible witnesses, was given one of each of the four leading cigarettes to smoke.
