### PORTLAND AMONG HONOR CITIES FOR FIRE PREVENTION

WASHINGTON, Mar. 29.—(AP)—The city of Philadelphia was today awarded the grand prize in the 1927 fire waste prevention contest conducted by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States and the National Fire Waste Council.

Divided into five population groups, the winners showed the best fire prevention records in their classes, with Philadelphia having the best record of all. Reports were received from 329 cities. On a per capita basis, the fire loss in 1927 was \$2.70 compared with \$3.07 in 1926 and \$3.77 in 1925. A gain in fire department efficiency and improvement in building construction and in housekeeping methods was indicated by a 14.25 per cent reduction in the number of fires in which the damage exceeded \$1000. A decrease in the number of deaths by fire was also shown. The percentage decrease in the number of persons killed as compared with the preceding five-year advance was 12.4. ### GERMAN OVERSEAS PLANE LANDBOUND BY SEVERE GALE

BALDUNNEL AIR DROME, DUBLIN, March 29.—(AP)—Junkers motor plane Kremen, bound to the earth with ropes and its wheels blocked by empty gasoline cans, rocked in an Irish gale today instead of soaring across the Atlantic. Weather conditions here were almost as bad as those reported from the middle of the Atlantic and the American coast. Baron Ehrenfried Gunther von Hunsfeld, leader of the trans-Atlantic flight, hoped to get off at dawn. His pilots, Captain Herman Koehl and Arthur Spindler, were against any attempt to take off, and the Irish air force authorities said it would be suicide to attempt to start against such conditions with even worse prospects as the flight progressed. The flight was then postponed to tomorrow at the earliest. A rescue party lumbered up and down the long stretch of ground beyond the wooden runway, ironing out the soggy ground so that the five-ton plane would not stick in the ruts. The fliers had breakfast at 4 with the German consul general and other members of the German community in Dublin and made their trip to the airfield despite the weather. Irish weather experts believe that the Atlantic weather is likely to delay the flight for several days at least unless Baron von Hunsfeld insists upon starting.

### CALIFORNIA COW IS BUTTERFAT CHAMP

CHICAGO, Mar. 29.—(AP) Anna Payne Pietsch, a California Holstein Friesian cow is the new champion of the United States in butterfat production as a senior two-year-old during a period of 305 days. She produced 794.32 pounds of butterfat, equivalent to 523 pounds of butter, from 22,298.3 pounds of milk, according to the records of the advanced quality office of the Holstein-Friesian association of America. The amount of butter, according to today's market is worth \$13.25. Anna Payne Pietsch was bred by H. O. Viemann of Avoca, Iowa and is now owned by Mrs. F. Stenest of San Lorenzo, Cal.

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
