Saturday marks the beginning of a new era in the marketing of rabbits. Heretofore the public took a chance on the safety of the rabbits it purchased. While the majority of breeders sold only the very best quality stock, occasionally an unscrupulous person placed on the market rabbits that were diseased, which rendered it unfit for consumption.
