WETTEST MARCH IN MANY YEARS: 2.80 IN. OF RAIN

While the exact official weather report figures for March will not be available until after tomorrow from the rain that had fallen up to early this morning, followed by a more or less steady rain the remainder of the day, it is known that this month will be recorded as one of the wettest March's for years past, with a precipitation at least above 2.50 inches, as marked the average rainfall for March during the past 12 years, which average is 1.13 inches.

No rain had fallen during the 24 hours ending at 3 o'clock this morning, but fifteen minutes later light rain started up which continued until early this afternoon, for a time with prospects of resuming again any minute.

In all, up to 5 p. m. today 13.90 inches of rain had fallen in Medford, of which 5.51 inches had fallen since January 31st last, and 2.80 inches since the first of this month.

Rain is forecast for tonight and Sunday, along with mild weather.

This month's rainfall for Grants Pass, which section always has heavier rains than here, up to early this morning totaled up to 2.76 inches, as against the average March rainfall for that section of 2.18 inches. The month's rainfall for both sections was much augmented by the heavy rain of the past week end and forecast of this week.

NEW SUIT FILED IN DISPUTE OVER GARBAGE RIGHTS

A complaint, which was brought against the Spencer and C. W. Welty, farmers, by the City Sanitary Service, was on file today in the county clerk's office. The complaint alleges that the defendants are collecting garbage from a number of Medford hotels and cafes in direct violation of a contract they had with the city of Medford, amounting to them the exclusive right of collecting all garbage in the city.

The plaintiffs claim that Spencer and Welty are taking garbage, suitable for use as fuel, from the Hotel Medford, Hotel Jackson, Hotel Holland, Pacific Pool Hall, Crater Lake cafe, Coffee Cup cafe, Do-Drum cafe, Jewell cafe, J. N. cafe and other eating places, which were not listed.

The defendants, in a suit against the city, are attempting to obtain a permanent injunction against the Sanitary Service from having the exclusive garbage collection privilege. Welty and Spencer are still collecting their garbage, a restraining order having been issued in circuit court, preventing the City Sanitary Service from making collecting from the places visited by Welty and Spencer. Until the matter is definitely settled, the two farmers will continue to make their regular collections.
