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LITTLE CHANCE FOR LOWDEN

One of the strange anomalies of the approaching presidential campaign is that the richest candidate and the one most closely connected with Big Business is the one who promises to receive the support of the most radical element of the Republican party

The discontented farmers; militant laborites, remaining in the Republican fold; and the former populists of the corn belt are rallying to the standard of former Governor Lowden of Illinois

Governor Lowden was a corporation lawyer in Chicago before he was president of the Pullman company, is one of the wealthiest men in Illinois, and by temperament and training is a rock ribbed defender of the Old School

Why the agrarian irregulars should be for him, it is difficult to say, unless his ex-officio support of the McNary-Haugen measure, and his ownership of a show-place farm at Oregon, Illinois, should have convinced them that he is, in reality, what every political candidate claims to be, "the farmer's friend"

Governor Lowden has already picked up several delegates in Minnesota, most of the delegates from the Dakotas, and is reported as strong in Iowa and Missouri. He has a certain following in Oregon as well

But we fear the former Governor of Illinois will not get very far in the Republican convention. For the men who will really control the machinery of that convention won't be in any mood to take chances this year. They will be particularly loath to take chances with the man who eight years ago was forced out by charges of corruption

No one in the "know" believes for a minute that Lowden had anything personally to do with the purchase of Southern delegates, but the fact remains the delegates were purchased in his name. The people may have forgotten the incident. But the Democrats haven't, nor have the Republican board of strategy

So, unless the political situation hinges completely between now and June, Mr. Lowden, excellent man that he is, won't have a Chinaman's chance to get the nomination at Kansas City. The candidate this year must, like Caesar's wife, be above suspicion, particularly as far as slush funds and oil scandals are concerned

It is more conceivable that Hoover would miss the nomination than Lowden would get it. Which places the former Governor of Illinois one the short end of a twenty-to-one bet

Personal Health Service

By WILLIAM BRADY, M. D. Signed letters pertaining to personal health and hygiene... TOO TIRED TO RESIST THE MICROBES

One of the fundamental facts I teach is that wetting or chilling or even suffering from exposure to cold can do the worst damage no other bad effect than frostbite

Now there is something new about that teaching, and the conspers any people want positive advice or instruction, not negative, so let's do an algebraic stunt—maybe I am just betwixt

In quasi-scientific circles, particularly among the quasi-scientists who launch these big nationwide drives or campaigns of intensive study to get the truth about what quack-scientists call "the common cold," it has become the fashion to insist that some of the highest viewpoint is logical enough to assume that a parcel of low, turking microbes would unerringly pick on a person when he is fatigued or or thoroughly tired

The theory that fatigue renders one more liable to contract pneumonia or other respiratory disease is eagerly accepted by the public. It seems so reasonable and the idea has been so thoroughly sold to the public by various commercial interests that the layman's viewpoint is logical enough to assume that a parcel of low, turking microbes would unerringly pick on a person when he is fatigued or or thoroughly tired

And, finally, it is pure human nature for one to imagine, when stress is worn out with toil and brain strain and all that sort of bunb, that one's "powers of resistance" are temporarily paralyzed or exhausted or enfeebled. And right there is the trouble—immunity to pneumonia or other respiratory infection is not "resistance" at all

There is no such thing as "resistance" in that sense. The highest attainable degree of immunity against a given germ disease cannot prevent the individual from having the disease if he gets an overdose of the virulent germ

All the newer knowledge of immunity gained chiefly through animal experimentation, indicates that fatigue does not impair immunity. In fact, some experiments have rather suggested that animals thoroughly fatigued by prolonged labor are less readily inoculated with the pneumonia germ

Anyway, I am glad to give this assurance: When you're quite tired out and so weary that you almost want to believe the worst, remember your immunity is still as strong as ever and you are no more likely to catch anything than your lazy neighbor is

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Weekly Foreign News Review

(By The Associated Press) Premier Benito Mussolini of Italy has carried out another of his determined plans to make an absolute fascist state of his country. He placed under control of all Italian youth, ordering by decree dissolution of all juvenile organizations except the Balilla and Avanguardisti bodies, destined to be incorporated into the fascist military and political party

Against this, Pope Pius XI voiced disapproval, declaring before the diocesan board of Rome that he was pained and grieved at realization of existence of the fascist plan to make a monopoly of the education of Italian youth, physical, moral and spiritual

Because of this controversy which has arisen like a cloud over "negotiations" between the holy see and the government for extension of rights of the vatican, fears have been expressed that there will come a cessation, at least temporarily, of efforts to settle what is known as the "Roman question" that has existed since 1870, the fall of Roman temporal power

Immigration experts have gathered at Havana. They represent 29 nations and are expected to be in session for three weeks. The subject of immigration has grown to be one of the utmost importance to many nations, some of which object to restrictions which have recently been imposed, particularly by the United States

The American ambassador to Mexico, Dwight W. Morrow, is credited with a great diplomatic victory in bringing about a settlement of the Mexican oil question with President Calles of Mexico. This has been the subject of bitter controversy for ten years, and where the attempts at scientific diplomacy failed, the "face to face" talks of Morrow with the president of Mexico and other Mexican officials, social in some respects, succeeded

Mexico seems now ready to afford the foreign oil companies the rights to the lands which they have exploited and the oils they produced. Minor questions, as between the government and individual companies are yet to be disposed of, but it is declared that the objectionable features of the petroleum law have been eliminated to the satisfaction of the American government
