GIBRALTAR, April 3.—(AP)—Commander H. M. Daniel was found guilty by a court martial today of actions prejudicial to discipline growing out of the famous Royal Oak affair at Malta.

Captain Kenneth G. B. Dewar, also of the Royal Oak, is scheduled to face similar charges.

Commander Daniel was sentenced to be dismissed from his ship and to be severely reprimanded. The sentence implies dismissal from his ship but not from the service. He will be reduced to half pay until it pleases the admiralty to appoint him to another ship or another post. The admiral cast reflections on music furnished by the marine band.
