

WIFE GIVEN HALF WARREN FORTUNE UPON AGREEMENT

CHICAGO, April 2.—(AP) "Grab-stake" agreement between a husband and wife who rose together from comparative poverty to wealth has been recognized by a Chicago master in chancery in a recommendation to the superior court that Harry H. Warren turn over to his wife a half interest in the Warren Seed Cleaning company.

Mrs. Warren, who once was a "hand" on the ranch of the map she later married, will receive stock valued at \$225,000 if the master's decision is sustained by the courts.

It was Mrs. Warren's contention that she was a partner in her husband's company and thus entitled to half of the company stock just as a mining prospector is entitled under the rules of the hills to a half interest in his partner's discoveries. Her plea that she also was entitled to a half interest on the ground that she, rather than her husband, had the idea on which the Warren company success was founded, was disallowed in the master's report.

The seed cleaning invention, Mrs. Warren testified, developed from a vacuum brush she devised to relieve dandruff. Her husband denied this, testifying that the idea for the invention came from watching Indians picking defective seed from the good by floating them in a crock of water.

MISSING LASS IS FOUND SLAIN

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Apr. 2.—(AP) The hunt for Alice Leonard, 15-year-old high school girl who disappeared January 28 when she left home to attend a basketball game, was at an end today and authorities attempted to learn how she was slain.

The girl's body was found last night near the yard of the school in Mayfield, a Cleveland suburb by Bernard Perk 17. The body had been concealed by high weeds for more than two months.

The girl was killed by a blow which crushed the right side of her head, Coroner A. J. Pearce said.

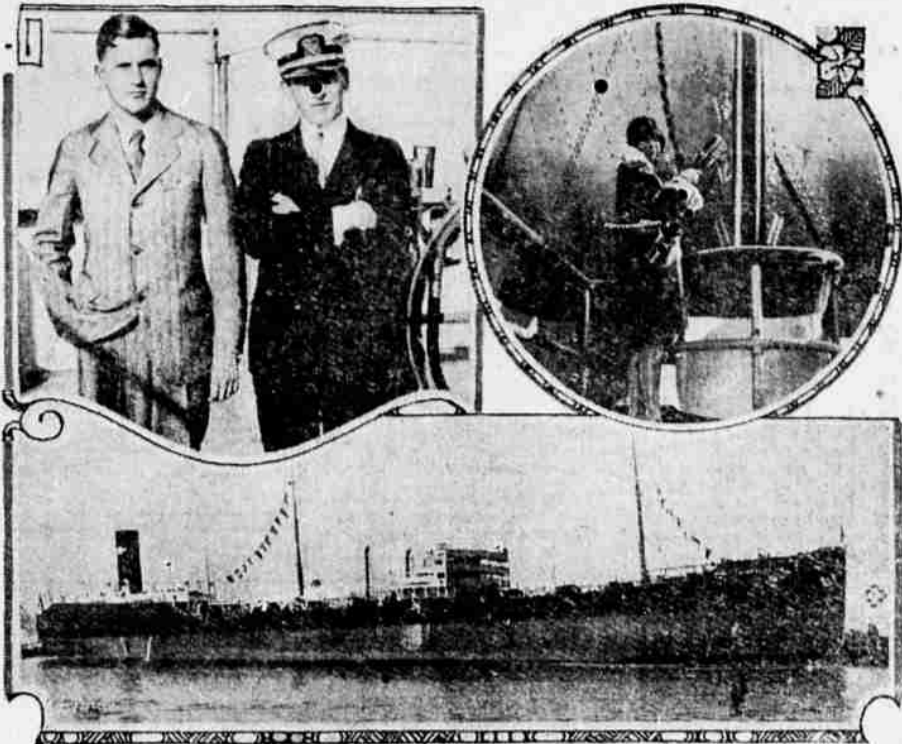

Fastest Tanker Heads Calpet Fleet

Especially appropriate to her name and the day, the "Mary Ellen O'Neil," new flagship of the tanker fleet of the California Petroleum corporation, made her first appearance in Los Angeles harbor March 17. She was piloted to the Calpet marine terminal on Mormon island in Wilmington, where she was tied up to the dock and orders given to "dress ship" for a formal all-day reception and inspection conducted under direction of Capt. R. B. Armstrong and his crew of 41 men.

Mary Ellen O'Neil, pretty sponsor of the new tanker, who officiated at the christening and launching of the ship a few weeks ago in Chester, Pa., is the daughter of P. H. O'Neil, a member of the board of directors of the California Petroleum corporation. She was assisted in the ceremonies by her brothers, L. B. and John T. O'Neil.

"This new Calpet tanker represents an investment close to \$2,000,000," according to W. L. Bunker, in charge of marine transportation for Calpet, who says, "She is the second largest tanker in the world, one of the fastest, and probably the finest, is 520 feet long, 70 foot beam and 40 feet deep. Driven by a twin-screw Diesel power plant, she makes an average speed of 12 knots an hour. She carries fuel for a 75-day cruise, has a cargo capacity of 140,000 barrels."

Miss Mary Ellen O'Neil, after whom the new tanker is named, entertained her family and friends at a gala celebration in honor of the arrival of the new flagship of the Calpet fleet.

ARKANSAS WOODS SWEEPED BY FIRE; HUNDREDS TOLL

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Apr. 2.—(AP)—Rain was anxiously awaited by forest rangers and hundreds of volunteer workers today to aid them in fighting the most serious series of fires in the state's history in its two national forests.

One death, that of the one-year-old son of Jim Tully, has been reported, and each request from the district has brought news of added losses and many new outbreaks.

The Tully child was burned to death when his father's home in Baxter county was swept by flames.

Road crews and even students from Arkansas Tech at Russellville were fighting heroically to check the red wall of destruction on the northern frontier which extends from Baxter county through Newton county and as far south as Pope.

On the west front the Ouachita reserve, more than 500 men were battling scores of fires which extend from Scott county south to Polk and east to Montgomery.

Losses in both reserves have been estimated at about \$200,000,000, with millions of dollars worth of pine timber in danger.

Flames fanned by a high wind were subdued after an hour's fight by the Corvallis fire department. The plant, owned by Sam Moore, chairman of the state lime board, and his son, Merle, recently an instructor at Benson Polytechnic school at Portland, was running nearly full capacity with 100,000 eggs. The loss was partly covered by insurance.

DEATH HANDBILLS FOR AMERICANOS

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, April 2.—(AP)—Advises from Matagalpa today said that handbills were being distributed in the region of the town urging the natives to kill the Americans, especially any marines they encountered.

It was assumed that the handbills had come from the headquarters of General Augustino Sandino, rebel leader.

Reports continued their pursuit of scattered bands of rebels, but no clashes had been reported.
