## ASHLAND PEOPLE AID IN HUMANE SOCIETY PROJECT

ASHLAND, April 3.—The directors of the Jackson County Humane society met in Ashland on Saturday afternoon with a group of interested Ashland people at the home of Mrs. J. H. The meeting was called to discuss the proposed extension of the original society for the protection of dogs, which was organized at Medford some time ago, and the plan is to extend the scope to reach the other towns in the valley and to include all animals in the protection program. It was decided that the Ashland group should form a committee to solicit memberships in Ashland, and Mrs. J. H. Fuller was chosen chairman of the committee. Memberships at \$1 each are open to all who are interested in the thoughtful care of animals and in seeing that all animals have a fair show.
