

CHANGED McNARY FARM HELP BILL 'EXPLAINED HOUSE'

WASHINGTON, April 5.—(AP)—The new McNary-Hauten bill introduced yesterday was described to the house today in a formal report by Chairman Hanger of its agriculture committee as a measure differing materially from that vetoed a year ago by President Coolidge and so modified that it now proposes two "entirely separate and distinct" remedies for the farm situation.

"The changes which have been made," the bill "meets in a large measure the objections expressed by the president in his message returning the former measure without his approval.

"Especially does the present bill provide an almost unlimited opportunity for the administrative body created under it to deal with the problem of agricultural surpluses through loans which those who have opposed the past committee bills urge would be fully adequate to meet the situation.

"Both methods are directed toward promoting orderly marketing, and, in the case of tariff-protected commodities, making the tariff effective."

"The report, drafted by the Iowa republican by the direction of the agriculture committee and concurred in by 15 of its 21 members, is expected to be followed in a few days by one or more minority reports from those opposing the bill.

THE NEW YORK PACKER TELLS OF HEARTY TRIP

"While Mr. Hearty was at Medford plans were made for the enlargement of the pre-cooling facilities and the erection of a building permitting of greatly increased packing capacity and a more commodious office. The Cold Storage company at Medford formerly had a pre-cooling capacity of 12 cars a day. Due to the wonderful condition of the Eskimo Kelp brand of pears during the current season, which were pre-cooled, it is certain that even with the increased capacity the pre-cooling facilities will be strained. The Eskimo Kelp brand of apples which are being sold now by the Hearty company in New York are still hard and green, showing no stem end shrivel or decay. The trade declares that they are in better condition by far than any other mark which is being offered. The Hearty company still has cars of the D'Anjou which might be kept until June, but in the interests of the shippers who own the fruit and in line with their usual conservative policy they plan to clean up within the next two weeks."

Investigation revealed that last Saturday Knowlton washed his car with a solution of chloride of lime.
