UNION AIR LINES TAKES OVER WEST COAST COMPANY

PORTLAND, Ore., April 6.—(AP)—The West Coast Air Transport company, which recently started aerial passenger and express service on the coast, was taken over today by the Union Air Lines, a corporation organized to inaugurate a transcontinental aerial service. The announcement was made here today by Charles Y. Eakin, vice-president of both companies. He said the Union Air Lines, a \$2,000,000 corporation, had paid \$500,000 for the West Coast line, which would continue operation under its own name with Portland as headquarters.

Eakin said planes would be added to the service as fast as they could be constructed. Two ten-place monoplane already are in service and two similar ships are under construction. Eakin said that the Union Air line was negotiating with two other air lines with a view to purchase and that it contemplated extending its service case from Los Angeles.

Obituary

WORKS—Orville Works passed away at his home in Talent, April 5th at the age of 85 years, one month and two days, after an illness of several months. He was born in Defiance county, Ohio, March 3rd, 1839.

At the age of twenty-four he enlisted in the Civil war, belonging to Co. M, 3rd Iowa Cavalry, serving for full duration of war. He enlisted as a private and was promoted to sergeant March 1st, 1862, serving in that capacity until the close of the war. After the war he bought a small farm in Iowa in 1875 he moved to Stockville, Neb., and after six years he again moved to Iowa.

In 1882 he was married to Mary Ellen Whittington in Davis City, Iowa. Then he returned to Nebraska until 1894, when they moved to Oregon where they have since resided.

Besides his wife he leaves eight children, Frank and Orville Works, Mrs. Henry Burnett, Mrs. Clifford Garvin, Howard Works, Mrs. Riley Nywander, Mrs. D. Stedman and Byron Works, all living in Oregon.

Funeral services will be conducted by the G. A. R. at 2 p. m. Sunday, April 8, at 2 p. m. Conger funeral parlors in charge of arrangements.
