The clinic is financed by the Jackson County Public Health Association and is located in the offices of the health unit in the new court house. A drive for 50 cent memberships to pay these and sick room supplies is now being conducted with Mrs. J. C. Wells in charge of the Medford campaign.

Doctors of the County Medical Society along with the public health nurses have been working overtime examining children not only for the Health Honor Roll but also to check up their condition for athletic contests. This week they are finishing their work in the schools of Gold Hill, Phoenix, Medford, and Jacksonville.

May first (Child Health Day) will witness the parade in Medford of the Health Honor Roll children of the grade schools. Next day the pre-school children summer round-up begins under the auspices of the Parent Teacher associations of the county. The 5 and 6-year olds will be gathered into clinics in every section of the county by the health unit.

Sanitary Service is to start soon. With the arrival of warmer and more favorable weather, the City Sanitary Service company will set its organization of garbage collectors into 100 per cent operation in a very short time, according to L. W. Phillips, manager and president of the company, who said today that it will probably be only a couple of days before complete operation will be realized, meaning that twice per week collections will be made in the residential section of Medford.

New collection routes are now being completed and equipment at the dump yards east of the city is being rapidly broken in for the heavy reception of garbage and for its rapid disposal.

NO MORE REVERSE TURNS DOWNTOWN
Eighteen yellow and black signs were placed today at intersections on Sixth street and on Main street, prohibiting reverse turns in an effort to relieve traffic congestion and decrease the possibility of collisions. From henceforth at the intersections marked by the signs it will be unlawful for a motorist to turn completely around and go back down a street up which he had just driven.

If a motorist desires to reverse his direction of traveling on a street, it will be necessary for him to drive around a block, making only left and right hand turns. City Traffic Officer G. J. Prescott today said this new ruling would be rigidly enforced.
