JOBS NEEDED FOR BALL PLAYERS, IS PLEA OF MANAGER

Court Hall, the manager of the Medford baseball team being organized for the Southern Oregon and Northern California league, wants jobs locally for several good outside players, whom he would like to sign for the local club, and makes an appeal for the business men of the city to come forth with such jobs.

Manager Hall's plan is to have two or three of these good non-resident and non-professional players on the team as a nucleus, and the remainder of the team to be filled by local players.

Therefore he appeals to any business man or several of them who can furnish employment for such outside players, to let him know at once. So far he has been unable to find such employment for these few men. Mr. Hall points out that Weed, Dunsmuir and some other towns in the league have furnished employment for outside players wanted on their respective teams, and he feels that Medford should do the same. Any kind of a job, he says, except common labor. He will furnish any business man interested with the qualifications of the men he wants jobs for.

LIGHT FROST, IF ANY, PREDICTED; SECOND SMUDGE

The second frost of the season and consequently the second smudging of the week, came during last night, or rather early today, with the temperature going down in the city to 31 degrees, and to several degrees lower in some of the colder parts of the valley.

The smudging was light, with about 50 per cent of the smudging orchards being smudged as far as could be learned, did no damage. Although the San Francisco weather bureau had yesterday morning predicted a heavy frost, Floyd Young, the local government frost expert, gave out his forecast at 7 p. m. low enough to keep the orchardists on the safe side, that the temperature would not go lower than 29° in the city and immediate vicinity.

While frost was predicted by the San Francisco bureau this morning for tonight, today was warm and sunny and local predictions at noon were that there might be no frost, or if one came it would be light.
