The installation was an enjoyable affair with W. H. for airplanes in the United States. The commerce department today figured 1072 of these fields were equipped with sufficient facilities to qualify as airports and added that approximately 4000 additional fields cleared for emergency or temporary use of aviators were now being placed upon flying maps. Of the 1072 landing fields graded as airports, 241 are beacon and flood-lit and open to use by night as well as day. Every state in the union now has one or more of the airport landing fields.

The port not only furnishes space for planes to light but also repair shops, fuel supplies, hangars and sometimes radio beacons for guidance.
