GRAND JURY NOT IN SESSION AS MYSTERY GROWS

So far as could be learned the grand jury, which adjourned a week ago, this afternoon until today or for a period of ten days, and then to resume its special investigation begun several weeks ago, had not reconvened at press time this afternoon.

Whether or not the absence of Judge C. M. Thomas, who is holding a session of circuit court at Grants Pass today for Josephine county and who is expected home tomorrow, had anything to do with the grand jury not reconvening today, is not known, although it is generally understood that the jury could ordinarily convene and continue its investigation without his presence in the court house.

No one can be found outside of the jury personnel who knows when the grand jury will assemble again to finish this special investigation work, but rumor emanating from persons claiming to have close inside information, is that the present adjournment was made until such time as an important witness from the northern part of the state can appear before the jury.

In the meantime, general opinion is increasing, especially in political circles, for the grand jury report to be made as soon as possible before the limit for filing candidacies expires.

A general report in circulation is that whether or not several proposed candidates will be filed depends altogether on the character of the report of the grand jury. The limit for filing a candidacy in this county for a district office is 35 days before the election which makes that limit, Friday, April 13.

BUSINESS MEN'S GOSPEL SPEAKERS THRILL CROWDS

Inspiring gospel messages were delivered by Percy A. Bray, local attorney, and C. T. Nahss, speaker on the Business Men's gospel team program at the meeting held at the South Methodist church Sunday afternoon.

The church was filled with people from all denominations and the message consisted of the regular spirited testimonials, old-time gospel hymn singing, speaking and prayer. Special numbers consisted of solos by Choir Leader Arden Feebece and Attorney W. G. Trill.

Knows the Christ: Mr. Nahss delivered an inspiring appeal to those who haven't found the saviour, and told of how he knew that Christ was the real and only saviour of the souls of mankind. He stated that just merely joining church did not assure a man of salvation but that one should not only believe himself with the church but from that moment on should "pick up his cross and bear it."

Mr. Bray in a lengthy and fervent talk on the resurrection and the hope of man's salvation as a result, draws a beautiful word picture of the dramatic and tragic death of the saviour. He chose as the subject for the foundation of his talk the words "Fear Not," which were used by the angel of the Lord at the tomb of Christ when comforting Mary Magdalene, Mary and Salome, informing them that Christ had arisen.

The words "Fear not," used by the angel, according to Mr. Bray, did not mean that people follow Christ need not fear physical injury and persecution at the hands of men, but that it was a message to Christians down through the ages that even though they be defiled, insulted and crucified by men they had the assurance of eternal life through the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Gospel Team May Split: So many are the invitations coming to the gospel team from outside communities, and in order that they might be filled at the earliest possible date, it may be necessary for the gospel team to divide its forces and hold meetings at two or three places each Sunday afternoon.

He declared that the great war had cemented the nation together and that it was the duty of the American Legion to give service to the coming generation by sustaining this nationalism, born on the battlefields."

Education of the young by "home, religious and patriotic teaching" was declared to be another fundamental object of the Legion, and that its power would always be exerted towards betterment of home and land, "with no selfish objectives." Intolerance was scored as an enemy of national peace.

Paul H. McDonald, general chairman of the state convention committee, gave a report on the progress to date and assured the banquet that the reunion next August in this city would be the largest ever held in Oregon.
