TO THE PUBLIC

Statements going around the city that householders who either do not have garbage or dispose of it by burning or other sanitary methods, are compelled by city ordinance to have their garbage collected by the new garbage company and pay them \$1.00 a month and provide a can for garbage; that the home owners themselves cannot take their own garbage to the city dump; that either the city has increased or authorized the new garbage company to increase the charges for collecting garbage, are so palpably untrue that we shall take no notice of them, except to state that there has been no change in the charges for collecting garbage and that, with the exception of a few added provisions for protection of the city, the present garbage contract is almost identical with those that have been in force for the last six or eight years.

Statements occasionally heard to the effect that the city has given an exclusive contract or monopoly to the new garbage company, but did not to the former garbage people, are also untrue; all of the garbage contracts made by the city the last six or eight years have been exclusive contracts and have, all of them, included within their terms garbage and offal from hotels and restaurants, and there has been no change in regard to hotels and restaurants.

Anyone having complaint either regarding service or charges for collecting garbage is requested to take the matter up with Mr. L. W. Phillips, manager of the new garbage company, at his office at Jarmin & Woods' drug store, where he can be found between the hours of 9 and 11 a. m., and in case satisfactory adjustment cannot be made, are requested to notify the City Recorder in writing in order that the city may make proper investigation.

NORMAL BASEBALL OUTLOOK IS GOOD; U. OF O. FROSH 1ST

SOUTHERN OREGON NORMAL, Apr. 7.—(Special).—Baseball prospects at Southern Oregon Normal look good. In spring a young man's fancy lightly turns to thoughts of baseball. Despite the snowy weather, baseball is in the air, and who can resist the alluring call of the diamond and the old ball game. Even the trees on the hills above the school are handling their highest tops toward the field, as though to catch a glimpse of the activity there.

With the first game of the year, which will be played here against the Oregon Frosh less than three weeks hence, Coach McNeal is trying out new combinations of players every night, and hopes before long to pick a smooth working team that will bring home the victories for the Southern Oregon Normal school.

The failure of Wirth and Newson, both experienced infielders, to return this quarter, left McNeal with a big gap to fill. At present, however, the infield looks good for the short time they have been working together.

In the hot corner, Alva Laws, one of last year's lettermen, looks the best so far. He has had plenty of experience, is a heavy player and a good all-around man. Melvin Rothan, our own little Buttercup, is also a contender for the third base position, but has been troubled with a sore arm of late.

Arnold (Cocky) Gonnell is the best bet for the shortstop position. He has both good fielding and hitting ability.

"T-Bone" Caldwell at present seems to be the best second baseman on the field. He stops everything that comes his way, and with his "Lulu" bat says he will lead them all in batting average.

A hot fight is being waged for the honor of holding down the keystone sac, and Orle Moore has, for the time, the call over other competitors. Weldon McBeck, former Medford high star, will make a strong bid for his favorite position and works well with other men. Dartnell, with the advantage of height and reach, looms as a prospective first baseman.

There is a dearth of mound-men in the K. O. N. S. camp and so far Coach McNeal has been able to unearth but two pitchers of merit, Louis Stewart and "Stu" Kincaid, the latter had from Grants Pass. Both men have had considerable experience. Stewart is, at present, in the best condition, but predictions do not always hold true, it looks as though Southern Oregon is well supplied with pitchers, neither have yet had a real test of their abilities, and therefore one cannot tell who will be favored to start the coming Frosh game. Each heavier possesses marked ability and upon their shoulders rests the burden of hurrying their team to victory.

On the receiving end behind the bat, Dutch Shields will probably get the call. Under the McNeal system, the pitcher and the team, to a large extent, depend upon the catcher for guidance and Shields' experience serves him well. Warren Conrad also looks like the goods in the catcher's position. He, too, has been troubled with a sore arm of late. Conrad is an ex-Medford star of note.

In the outfield are five men: May, Spier, Roberts, Robinson and Ashcraft, fighting for three positions. Of the lot May is the best flycatcher and looks like a cinch for center. Vern Spier, too, is an adept at snatching the peller from the air, and the others look like the makings of a real outfield.

As to the batting ability of the squad, we cannot state. They have not yet been under the heavy fire of a tricky pitcher, and would favor to start the coming Frosh game. So far, in practice, not a great deal has been shown in the bickery-wielding line. Two of three men look good at the plate, consistently knocking out the hits that would be good for bases anywhere. Like all coaches, McNeal stresses the well placed hit, good for one or two bags, rather than the slugging type of hitting which is not so consistent.

So far, although piecemeal, Southern Oregon Normal was going to have a real baseball squad, one which will be hard for any team to down. Excellent material is on the field, Coach McNeal is the boy to develop it, and all indications point toward a great season.

The Women's League of the Southern Oregon Normal will sponsor a bridge tea the afternoon of April 21. The purpose of the tea is to obtain money for the scholarship fund. Letta Ashcraft is general chairman of the affair. The table managers, under the supervision of Mrs. Carless, report splendid progress in the selling of tables to the women of Ashland. Attractive decorations of cut flowers and palms have been decided upon by the decoration committee with Marie Davies as chairman. Other committee chairmen are Lois Jay Hanson and Isabelle Silver, refreshments; Lydia Oeder, score cards; Dorothy Bollen, entertainment; Mildred Maltz, publicity; Frances Wright, awards; Malvina Mitchell, Mary Galey, Barbara Brown, Pearl Wardle, Adelaide Smith and Rosalind Wise, table managers.

Spring tryouts for membership in the Alpha Tau Omega club of the Southern Oregon Normal will be held in three weeks at the school. Membership requirements consist of vouching from memory a poem, reading or short selection before the club for their approval. New members will be voted in by the club.

It was planned to send delegates to this meeting last summer but, owing to conflicts with examination week, it was found impossible to do so.

William Tucker was elected secretary to fill the vacancy left by Stanley Rogers.

A student mixer, sponsored by the Theta Delta Phi and Theta Beta Phi fraternities will be given Friday evening, April 13, at the Normal auditorium. A special invitation is extended to all interested in school.

The boys' and girls' activities of the senior high entertained the guests with a number of enjoyable selections. A violin solo by C. V. Howell, accompanied at the piano by Mrs. Hugh T. Mitchellmore, was well received. Fred Lockley of the Oregon Journal staff closed the program with short talks.

A blue and yellow color scheme was carried out at the tables where refreshments were served. The remainder of the evening was spent in dancing. It was announced at Friday's assembly by A. C. Strange, vice president of the school, that the high standards of the Southern Oregon Normal school have been recognized by the Northwest Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges. This information was received through a telegram from Dr. Frederick K. Bolton, former dean of the department of education of the University of Washington, who was a speaker at a recent assembly at the Normal, and who is chairman of the committee on recognition for the Northwest Educational association. Midwest institutions of higher learning aim to obtain the recognition of this committee. The Southern Oregon Normal is now recognized as offering a full two-year, standard normal course.

The University of Idaho, O. A. C. University of Oregon and the University of California, and a number of other institutions have recently recognized the Normal in a similar manner.

A meeting of the Women's League of the Normal was held Tuesday morning at the assembly hall. Plans for the coming bridge tea were discussed. The resignation of Letta Ashcraft, secretary was accepted and Mary Agnes Hunt was elected to take her place. A short discussion of sports for the league was held, but nothing definite was decided.

LONGVIEW TO GET NEW RAIL SERVICE BY THREE RAILROADS

WASHINGTON, Apr. 9.—(AP).—Direct trunk line passenger service for the city of Longview, Wash., was assured today by a decision of the interstate commerce commission, allowing the Northern Pacific, Great Northern and Oregon Washington railroads to render it.

The three railroads named were given permission to operate joint passenger trains under trackage rights over the line of the Longview, Portland and Northern railway in order to reach Longview.

The passenger train service of the three trunk lines between Seattle, Wash., and Portland, Ore., is now operated under a pooling arrangement. They now propose to acquire a trackage right over the Longview, Portland & Northern between Olney and Longview, a distance of 21 miles, and to divert four of the pool passenger trains, two in each direction, daily, over this route to Longview.

"The diversion of the pool trains would entail some loss in time," the commission said, "but this can be made up and will make no difference in the new schedule. The extraordinary development of Longview undoubtedly has resulted in very material benefits to surrounding communities and it may safely be assumed that the furnishing of direct trunk line passenger service to Longview will result in additional benefits to all concerned."

DAUGHTER OF SECY WILBUR RESCUED IN YOSEMITE PARK

LINDSAY, Calif., April 9.—(AP).—Rescued by forest rangers from a narrow ledge where darkness had trapped her during a trip to Yosemite valley, Miss Edna May Wilbur, daughter of Secretary of the State Curtis B. Wilbur, was home here today none the worse for her thrilling experience.

Miss Wilbur went to the park with a party of friends. She and Miss Ota E. King attempted late Saturday to descend the snow-covered trail from Glacier Point to the floor of the valley. Caught by darkness, they lost the trail, and presently found themselves on a narrow ledge, whence they feared to attempt further progress.

With a biting mountain wind tugging at their clothing, the girls huddled against the face of the cliff and called for help. Tourists in the valley 2000 feet below heard their cries and notified the forest rangers.

Five men reached the girls shortly before midnight, and after strenuous efforts succeeded in hauling them up to the trail with ropes. Once back on the trail, they were guided to safety and left for home after resting. Both girls are school teachers here.

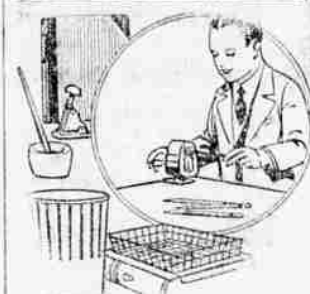
