GRAND JURY REPORT STILL INDEFINITE; HEAR NEW WITNESS

Mystery still surrounds the date when the grand jury, which reconvened today following an adjournment since last Monday, will make its report and inquiries around the court house this forenoon failed to shed any light when the deliberations of the inquisitorial body would be completed, adding to the suspense of the public, which has been anxiously awaiting for weeks a report from the jury. The jury is presumed to be meeting for a thorough investigation of the handling of the county prohibition funds.

An out-of-town witness, John Wilcox of Salem, was said to be undergoing an examination this forenoon. Wilcox, if it is the same man, operated as an agent in the two years ago as agent in the enforcement of the prohibition law. This forenoon before the jury convened said he did not know and had no way of knowing when the investigation would be completed.

MERCHANTS HOLD INTERESTING MEET

At the Merchants' Association meeting and dinner at the Hotel Medford last evening, W. H. Lydard submitted the report of the committee to look after street lighting, recommending that the lighting of Sixth street, with the new modern posts and lights be done at once so the work can be in before the American Legion convention. They also recommended that the lights on Main street be not changed now.

The cost of the Sixth street work is to be about \$9000, to be assessed to the property, which would be about \$3 per front foot. The lights and upkeep to be \$1 per post. The Copco company also agreed to put in the system and furnish lights for \$7.50 per month.

The report was adopted and the committee, consisting of W. H. Lydard, W. H. Leverette and H. Fluhrer, instructed to see the council to order in the system at once.

Marsh, groceries; Roland Hubbard, implement firm; Bob Strang, shoe stores; Jack Thompson, Copco; H. G. Frobach, electric stores; Henry Fluhrer, hardware; and Abijah Woods, retail lumber firm.

Court Hall and Heine Fluhrer presented the proposition of the local ball team and the league games were voted hearty support of the merchants. H. Fluhrer, Court Hall and Al Piche were appointed a committee to help boost the ball season.

The question of cleaning the downtown streets of refuse was brought up and Robert Strang, Al Piche and E. L. Scott appointed to make the request to the council.

The fair petitions were reported by H. O. Frobach as sufficient to put the one-half levy on the ballot and the county court will call the election for May 18.

Progress regarding a new air field was reported and the merchants were enthusiastic in their support of the proposition.

It was decided to get an outside speaker for the next meeting, and H. O. Frobach, Lee Tuttle and S. S. Smith were appointed to secure one.
