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GONZAGA FOUNDER SINGER BEQUEATHS BLACK LIST BY WHO WROTE BIBLE SAN DIEGO ESTATE D. A. R. MEMBERS IN CHINOOK, DEAD AS 'VETS' HAVEN CAUSES RUCTION

PENDLETON, Ore., Apr. 10.—(AP)—Father Joseph Cataldo, founder of Gonzaga university in Spokane and nationally known for his work among the American Indians, died at a local hospital late yesterday afternoon at the age of 92.

His 92nd birthday anniversary was observed on St. Patrick's day in Spokane and he was greeted by acolytes and laymen at a large celebration. For the past few weeks he has been at St. Andrew's mission on the Umatilla Indian reservation.

Father Cataldo was born on the island of Sicily and became a member of the Jesuit order at the age of 14. He had been a priest for 60 years. He came to the Pacific Northwest while the Civil war was in progress and founded practically all of the Catholic Indian missions in the northwest.

He took a very prominent part in the Nez Perce Indian war and is credited with having saved a large number of lives, both Indians and whites. Recognized as a friend of all tribes, he was able to carry on negotiations when other whites were barred. His linguistic abilities enabled him to speak innumerable Indian tongues, and one of his greatest achievements was translating the bible into Chinook.

He was seriously injured in Pendleton 23 years ago when he was thrown from a buggy. Funeral services will be held at St. Andrew's mission on Thursday at 10 a. m., with Bishop McGrath of Baker officiating.

MINNEAPOLIS, Apr. 10.—(AP)—Madame Ernestine Schumann-Heink, famous singer, announced last night she had given her estate of Grossmont, 14 miles from San Diego, Calif., to her "boys"—disabled war veterans of the World war.

"Mother Schumann," as "her boys" called her, was the guest of honor of local disabled veterans at a "ham and cabbage" dinner, her "favorite dish," she said.

The noted singer announced that she had bequeathed the \$230,000 estate to Mayor George E. Leach of Minneapolis, to be administered as a haven for sick and disabled veterans and their families. She gave the home, she said, to show her love for the "boys" who played "taps" for her two sons who lost their lives in the World war, one fighting for Germany and the other for America.

"You have honored me by calling me 'mother,'" she said. "You honored me by honoring my boy who died on a submarine. He may have killed some American boys with his submarine, but he could not help that. It was war, you know. But you honored him. That is why I give you Grossmont. I love you; that is why I do this. I will love you until the great Commander calls me."

Madame Schumann-Heink appeared in a farewell concert here Sunday night and remained here until tonight for the dinner. Mayor Leach said he would seek to have Noble Bradford, Utah, ambassador to Cuba, and Major-General Douglas MacArthur, Chicago, serve with him as trustees for the estate.

Grossmont is near the sea. There is a 32-room house and there are orange and lemon groves and a vineyard. "Mother Schumann" wept as "her boys" led her from the room after the dinner.

BOSTON, April 10.—(AP)—A charge that leadership of the Daughters of the American Revolution had been usurped by a small group of individuals who for personal purposes are exercising militaristic and anti-communistic movements was made today by Mrs. Helen Tufts Hall of Cambridge, who last week in a speech said the organization had blacklisted hundreds of persons as speakers.

An 18-page pamphlet entitled "Our Threatened Heritage," was the medium used for the dissemination of the protest against the blacklist.

The pamphlet charges that chiefly responsible for the blacklist and similar objectionable trends in the society's national policy were Fred R. Marvin, described as a publisher of "daily data sheets of the key men of America"; H. Hunter, head of the Industrial Defense association, and Mrs. Margaret C. Robinson of the Massachusetts Public Interests league.

The pamphlet quotes Mrs. Alfred J. Brousseau, president-general of the D. A. R., as having replied to a letter protesting against the alleged influence of Marvin, Hunter and Mrs. Robinson, on the policies of the organization by saying, "I cannot enter into any discussion of these persons," whom the letter described as "traitors of a high order."

The pamphlet says that Mrs. Walker, chairman of the national defense committee of the D. A. R., wrote to others, "It gives me real pleasure to tell you that Mr. Marvin is again issuing very valuable releases under a new plan called the Daily Data Service."

Mrs. Brousseau, the pamphlet asserts, is a member of the advisory committee of the key men, it charges that Marvin sought to show among other things that the Teapot Dome and other oil lease investigations were inspired by communists and that he characterized Fall, Sinclair and others as patriots and victims of persecution.

SOCIALIST PARTY SELECT NOMINEES ON APRIL 13

NEW YORK.—(AP) The first presidential candidate to enter the 1928 lists with the endorsement of a national party will be chosen at the convention of the socialist party, opening here on April 13.

Two men, one mayor of a city which has long been a stronghold of socialism in America and the other head of a powerful labor organization, stand out for the nomination. Daniel Webster Hoan, has been mayor of Milwaukee since 1916. James Hudson Mather, president of the Pennsylvania Federation of Labor, with one of these men likely to head its ticket, the party is expected to turn to literary men for its candidate for vice-president. Among those mentioned as likely nominees have been Upton Sinclair, California novelist, and James O'Neal, also an author and journalist.

In the 1924 elections the socialist party gave its support to the presidential candidacy of the late Senator Robert M. LaFollette of Wisconsin, who was variously designated socialist or progressive candidate in various states.

SEX EQUALITY IN ALL THINGS, URGES ENGLISH SOCIETY

LONDON, England, April 10.—(AP) The emancipation of all women at the age of 21 has brought into existence "the fifty-fifty league," whose members want to do something to offset the placing of men voters in a minority in the United Kingdom.

The league stands for "the emancipation of men from feminist domination and it has issued a manifesto headed "the sex war." The league's contention that, as women will now be in a position to dictate the country's policy, they must be prepared to accept the logical consequences.

The manifesto therefore demands that immediately political power in the country is transferred from men to women. (1)—Women shall be liable to military conscription on exactly the same terms and conditions as men are, or may be liable thereto. (2)—All sex privileges, concessions and immunities, presently enjoyed by women shall be withdrawn. (3)—All laws and practices which relieve women of the economic consequences of their acts, shall be annulled. (4)—The marriage laws and all customs and usages which arise therefrom shall be rectified.

KING ALBERT IS NOT OPPOSED TO AMERICAN BRIDE

LONDON, April 10.—(AP)—King Albert of Belgium does not oppose the marriage of his nephew, Prince Charles Philippe, the Duke de Nemours, to Margaret (Daisy) Watson of Washington, D. C., the duke told The Associated Press today. Despite reports that his family in Paris had denied the engagement, the duke said he was going ahead with his plans to be married as soon as possible.

The prince, who is just over 25, although he looks several years older, confessed frankly that he had no money of his own. "Oh, yes, indeed! My family controls the purse strings but that won't stop me marrying the girl of my choice." He straightened up and felt his tie, which is a little tight, he said, and thought a moment. "Haven't I the whole world in front of me? I am strong, healthy and fond of outdoor life. Can't I go out and make my own living—a living for the both of us?"

The duke said that if his mother, the Duchess of Vendome, whose brother is the king of the Belgians, ever objected to the king to use his influence to prevent the wedding, he had never heard of it. In fact, he said, he did not believe that his mother ever took such action, as had been reported.

TITLE FILED FOR AUTO FEE BILL

SALEM, Ore., April 10.—(AP)—Secretary of State Koeber has filed the ballot title for the revised Stallard \$3 automobile license fee bill. The title, prepared by Attorney General Van Winkle, reads as follows:

"To provide a \$3 annual license fee for motor vehicles of all kinds except trucks, trailers, semi-trailers and electric vehicles for commercial purposes, for which classes such fees remain unchanged; also except passenger buses which it exempts from all license fees now paid except the present seat tax; also exempting motor vehicles not common carriers used primarily for commercial purposes from additional license fees which they now pay; exempting for-hire cars of all kinds from any and all license fees whatsoever, and abolishing all fees based upon the weight of motor vehicles."

CHICAGO, Apr. 10.—(AP)—Mrs. Elizabeth Whitaker, 22, and her three children, ranging from 18 months to three years of age, were burned to death today when fire destroyed their home. Four other persons were seriously burned.

SHOCKER RETURN FAILS TO AROUSE

NEW YORK, April 10.—(AP)—Pitcher Urban Shocker's announcement that he is returning to the diamond is not creating visible enthusiasm from Boss Huggins of the Yankees. "We don't care whether Shocker reports or not," Huggins said yesterday. "As a matter of fact, I had not counted much on him this year. We have several young pitchers available, and if Shocker doesn't care to report, it will be all the same with us."

Nevertheless, Huggins appeared to be interested in the news that Shocker had been granted reinstatement by Commissioner Landis. Shocker won 13 games and lost six with the world champions last season.

PRISON NEAR FOR DAUGHERTY AIDE

NEW YORK, April 10.—(AP)—Colonel Thomas Moiler, former alien property custodian, today had but a few days of liberty ahead of him before he must start serving an 18-months sentence in Alcatraz penitentiary. He was convicted on charges of conspiring to defraud the government of his honest and unbiased services in returning \$7,000,000 in property to the American Metal company, seized during the war, to a Swiss corporation. The supreme court of the United States yesterday upheld the conviction in refusing to review the case on appeal.
