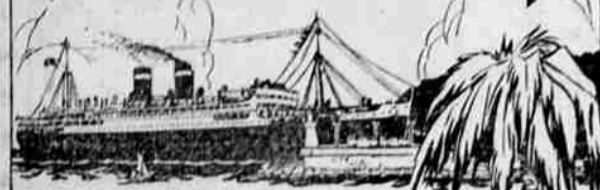

NAME JOHN MANN CHAMBER CHIEF AT DIRECTORS' MEET

The annual election of directors for the local chamber of commerce, which has occupied the attention of the large body of members for the past two weeks, terminated last night with John C. Mann, a past director, in the president's chair for the following year. C. C. Lemmon was elected first vice president; Howard Scheffel, second vice president; John Ogle, treasurer, and Ted Baker was re-elected to the office of secretary.

J. D. Russell, who held the office of president last term, was given a unanimous vote of thanks by the board for his services during the year and the splendid program of civic accomplishment carried out by him and his board. The development of local industry, the improvement of agricultural conditions, the addition of civic assets and the growth and increase in population during the year, was reviewed during last night's meeting as achievements either directly or indirectly due to the efforts of the chamber of commerce board of directors and members.

The publicity committee of the chamber, composed of Horace Bromley, Walter Leverette, Earl Gaddis and Herb Grey, was commended for the tremendous share of work they accomplished during the year in advertising the valley. Among other outstanding publicity features of the year were the Jubilee of Violins Reading, which brought thousands of people into the valley and centered the attention of newspaper readers in Oregon, Washington and California on local activities; the Jubilee and New Year editions of local papers, which reached homes throughout the United States, and told of the industries and beauties of southern Oregon; and the splendid radio program given both over KMEM, the Mail Tribune-Victoria station and KGH, which station exchanges publicity programs with KMEM for the mutual benefit of both sections of the country.

That this was the first fiscal year ending with a balance in the bank was another fact brought out by last night's meeting. The chamber of commerce treasury boasts the possession of \$365 with which to begin the activities of the new year.

BOHNERT VISITS FATHERLAND AND TELLS CONDITIONS

General conditions in Germany are not as bright as they have been painted, according to Wilhelm Bohnert, who returned recently from a visit with relatives at Lahr, Germany. He brings back reports that farmers are becoming disheartened with high rates of taxation that have been imposed upon them by the government to meet reparation payments and to pay high salaries and numerous government officials.

While on his visit at Lahr a mass meeting was held to protest the excessive taxation and in the neighborhood of 30,000 farmers took part. Smaller protest meetings have also been held and Mr. Bohnert fears that if the taxation problem is not furnished with a remedy, serious trouble between the peasantry and the government is apt to result.

Wages, as a rule, are low in Germany, a printer receiving 42 marks per week, corresponding to less than 12 dollars per week in United States exchange. Work is generally scarce, and to aid this situation, the government has been building houses for the incoming Germans who have been arriving for more than ten years from the neighboring countries, including Belgium, France, Poland and Russia.

The government finances the construction of the dwellings and it is up to the tenants to pay the cost in installments. As a rule, the installments are rarely paid, because of the lack of money. Automobiles are scarce in Germany, said Mr. Bohnert, but bicycles and motorcycles are plentiful, with practically all of the factories workers riding either bicycles or motorcycles to and from work. The automobiles that are in use in the Lahr section are small and were built with the idea of gasoline conservation in mind. Some have only three wheels and these models are said to be speedier than the ordinary American stock car.

Among the interesting reports brought back by Mr. Bohnert, who spent six weeks in Lahr, is the fact that church bells are just being put back into the steeples after an absence of over 12 years, the old ones having been utilized to supply metal for the manufacture of cannons during the World war. The bells are of the chiming variety and average three in a group.

Mr. Bohnert also visited the Saar mining region, now occupied by France, for a period of 15 years, at the end of which a plebiscite is to be held to determine whether or not the population of the district wishes to be ceded to France. However, the inhabitants are offering a passive resistance to French soldiers, who include a large number of negroes, and it is not uncommon that strife occurs between the soldiers and villagers. The expense of the 60,000 soldiers must be paid by Germany.

Despite the seemingly hard times the farmers as well as city folk have plenty to eat. None try to save money, inasmuch as they figure that if money is saved it would have to be turned over to the government, and so they are enjoying life while they may. Meat, principally beef, is imported from abroad, is cheaper than it can be raised in Germany, and sells for 80 pfennig per pound, equal to 29 cents here. Beer, wines and stronger drinks are still being sold, and during his stay in Germany Mr. Bohnert saw but very little intoxication. He said that he could not remember of one case. The popular Sunday institute, which has been in vogue for years and years, is still popular. Sunday crowds at beer gardens attesting the fact that the Germans still love their beer and pretzels.

While en route home Mr. Bohnert met several American citizens en route to America, after having gone bankrupt in Germany, for which country they left the United States during the highly inflated periods that followed the signing of the armistice. One man, an elderly, white-haired gentleman, left the United States to purchase a farm in the old country, and placed his remaining cash in a bank. The bank, like hundreds of other banks throughout the nation, was closed and the cash was gone. The old man's visions of living in the land of his fathers were blasted.

In conclusion, Mr. Bohnert declared that while Europe is all right for a pleasure trip, there is no country in as good a condition as southern Oregon. He owns and operates a large farm near Central Point and is one of the valley's most successful farmers. Perhaps the thing that impressed him most in connection with the trip was his recollection at the Lahr depot, before he wished him well on his trip to America, were present to welcome him back, with the exception of a few who had moved away and others who had passed away in the toll taken by the passing years.

At one time Mr. Preston was telegraph operator in Medford on the Southern Pacific, working here in the passenger station. He also was

night chief operator for the Western Union here. Mr. Preston was made the announcer on his own program last night, which was given in his honor by the KMEM staff, and for 30 minutes fans enjoyed the technical talks of Mr. Preston and the piano and songs given by Mr. Preston's friend with him on the trip, Frank Ship. The opening number was "Down in Jungle Town," and closed with "A Long, Long Trail." Mr. Preston will depart tomorrow for Yacay, Wash., to install the same type on KGY and from there to Seattle on KFOA.

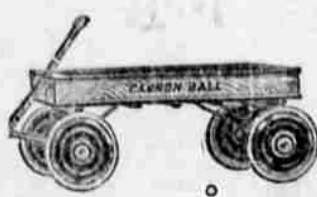
