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RECOVER BODY OF LOST BIRDMAN

NOIRFOLK, Va., April 11.—The body of commander T. G. Elliott, a native of Richmond, Va., one of three naval aviators who disappeared with a seaplane after leaving Hampton Roads for Annapolis at 2 a. m. February 25, was recovered this morning at Willoughby, a Norfolk suburb, where it was washed ashore.

Identity was established by a radiogram from his wife, found in one of his pockets, telling of the illness of their child. It was in response to this message that the flight from Norfolk to Annapolis was undertaken.

Charles D. Sierler, of Gloucester, who was walking along the beach shortly before daylight this morning stumbled over the body and notified police. Commander Elliott's face had been badly crushed, apparently when the plane crashed. He wore an aviator's suit over civilian clothes.

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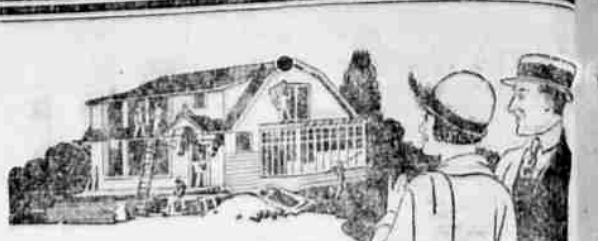
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
