Major Beires flew from the West African coast across the south Atlantic to the island of Fernando da Noronha, off the Brazilian coast, last year.

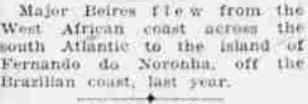

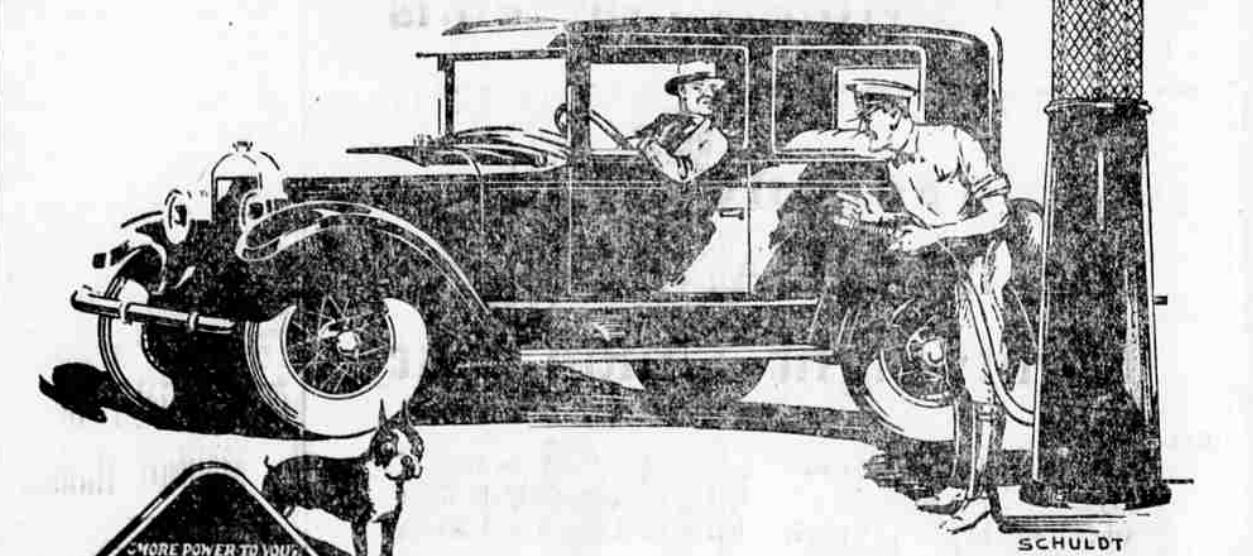
