VALLEY TOWNS TO COMPETE MAY 1ST HEALTH PARADE AT TALENT; ESTES GRANGE FORMED Elected MASTER

The health honor roll parade, which is to take place in Medford May 4, is furnishing an exciting objective of health eaching both in the class rooms and in the homes. At least the children have a very definite and tangible goal to reach instead of health for health's sake, as preached by their elders. They are to be the guests of honor that day and will no doubt start enough envy among the children not in the parade to interest them in getting on the honor roll next year.

The idea of the honor roll is not only to place the child on the path toward good health all his life, but also to accelerate public opinion by such a mass maneuver as a parade of children having a high standard of health, behavior and scholarship.

The grade school children of the following towns are competing for places in the honor roll: Jacksonville, Central Point, Gold Hill, Eagle Point, Phoenix and Medford. The combination of the quarantine and the beginning of the school year and of this honor roll being new in Jackson county prevents the majority of schools competing this year, but it is hoped all may have the opportunity next year.

Some of the figures are now available from the hands of the busy doctors and nurses, who are making the physical examinations. In Phoenix 183 children were examined, in Eagle Point 50.
