RIVAL QUESTIONS MRS. PINCHOT ON RUM, IS REBUKED

CANTON, Pa., April 12.—(AP)—Mrs. Cornelia Bryce Pinchot, wife of former Governor Gifford Pinchot, does not mind being interrupted in her political speeches by her opponent for the Republican congressional nomination in the

fifteenth Pennsylvania district, but she resents the implication that she drinks intoxicating liquors. In her whirlwind campaign of the district, she invaded the home town of her opponent, Representative Louis T. McFadden last night and while addressing a rally in a theater was frequently interrupted by the congressman, who was in the audience.

There were more than 700 persons in the theater and principally supporters of Mrs. Pinchot, when McFadden asked: "How dare you stand there and tell this audience you don't drink?" Shouts of "Put him out!" filled the building. "No, let him remain," said the Auburn-haired wife of the former governor. "I do not drink, and he knows it. If elected I shall vote

Duck Street Report

NEW YORK, April 12.—(AP)—Prices of gilt-edged stocks were soon bounding upward on the stock exchange today when group buying expanded with lower call loan rates. Advances of \$5 to \$12 a share were numerous among high-grade public utility, tobacco and railroad issues. General Motors reached 199 1/2, a new record price, late in the day, and General Electric \$188.50 and New York Central at 182 were at record levels. The closing was strong. Shares with a background of substantial earnings or favorable business prospects were heavily purchased in the late afternoon, particularly public utility and tobacco issues. Further scaling down of money rates to 4 1/2 per cent had a stimulating effect on sentiment. Lehigh Valley moved up 10 points and Philadelphia Company, Consolidated Gas, Brooklyn Union Gas and American Tobacco and Liggett & Meyers stocks 5 to 8. Radio had a sudden drop of five points to below 170. Total sales approximated 4,399,000.
