ALL VOTERS URGED TO REGISTER NOW; KEEP OPEN NIGHTS UNTIL COMPLETED

The registration office of L. E. Clark in the Chamber of Commerce building will not only be kept open tonight, but also on Monday and Tuesday nights, till 9 p. m., for the registration of all voters who are not registered. The registration for the coming primary will end Tuesday night.

While Mr. Tassak can register any county non-registered voter, any voter can register at the county clerk's office at the court house or with his or her local precinct registrar, during the regular hours on Monday and Tuesday. All persons who are not registered, if they expect to vote at the coming primary election, must do so, as swearing in of votes this year is prohibited by the constitution.

Every man and woman over 21 years old who has resided in the state six months prior to the primary, May 18, is entitled to vote, but must register at once. The only exception to registration before next Wednesday applies to those who voted at any election in the last two years and who have not since changed their legal residence.

BERLIN, April 14.—(AP)—Baron Von Huenefeld's aged mother did not know until last night, when the alleged sighting of the Bremen over Savannah was reported, that her son was on his great adventure. Her joy changed to grave anxiety when the rumor proved unfounded, but she was persuaded by her other son, Hans, to retire about midnight before the news of the forced landing on Greenly Island was received.

Hans remained at the telephone. He had the first intimation of the Bremen's landing at 2 a. m., but preferred not to wake his mother until confirmation came. Larsson Von Huenefeld is now awaiting direct word from her son, but neither she nor his brother, Hans, has made any plans about going to the United States.

"My brother made no arrangements to land the flight," Hans said. "It is therefore too early to say anything about our further plans. The mother is in poor health. As a talkman there is a glided horse shoe over the door of her apartment.

One of the men killed was Jack Walker, the ship's electrician. The bow of the vessel was badly damaged and the anchors were lost. SALEM, Ore., April 14.—(AP)—Application for authority to reorganize has been filed with the state reclamation commission by the Eagle Point irrigation district of Jackson county. It is the plan to reorganize the district on the same plan as recently adopted by the Grants Pass district.
