BILLINGS, Montana, April.—An old timer who came to Wyoming in 1874, got on the train at Billings, en route to Seattle to see some of his grandchildren. He was accompanied by his wife, a nice looking, well dressed woman, who, however, outweighed her venerable spouse by at least one hundred pounds.

He was a typical looking western pioneer—lean, wiry, keen blue eyes under shaggy eyebrows, and an undershot jaw—caused largely by the absence of upper teeth. He said it was the first train trip he had taken since the Portlan Lewis-Clark exposition, and he liked to sit in the smoking room and talk with the brakeman, who wasn't much of a tenderfoot himself, having been "braking" for 35 years.

'T's hard to explain what the 'West' was like forty years ago, I tell my boys they don't know how to enjoy life, and they laugh at me. They think I am just an old 'has been,' living in the past. Guess I am. But I know we were a happier lot in Wyoming back in the 80's than they are today. You bet we were. Why? Well, we had freedom. Could do anything we liked almost, as long as we didn't do anyone harm. The whole place was ours,—all the meat we could eat for the cost of a few cartridges—buffalo, antelope, all sorts of game. Plenty of dry wood for nothing, and a drink now and then without getting in jail for it. And round-up time,—say, what a time we had, men, women and kids all like a big family, everybody dancin' and laughin'—full of fun and health. Money?—nobody thought about money then. And that's the trouble today. Money, money, money,—that's all anybody thinks about. Even the few cow-boys left think more about their pay than their job. And that's the cause of all our trouble. Crime, graft, bootlegging,—it's all for the money. As I tell my boys, I don't know what the world is coming to.
