YANKEE HOCKEY TEAM WIN WORLD TITLE AND CUP

MONTREAL, April 14.—(AP)—The gallant band of New York Rangers brought the historic Stanley cup, emblematic of the world's professional hockey championship, back to the United States for the second time in the 26 years of competition by conquering the Montreal Maroons in the fifth and deciding game tonight by two to one.

By tonight's triumph, the Rangers, champions of the American division, captured three of the five games in the world series with the Maroons, finalists in the international game.

The Stanley cup was placed in competition in 1892, and with the exception of the 1917 season, when Seattle of the Pacific coast league defeated the Canadians for the trophy, the symbol of hockey supremacy had never left the dominion. Last year the Ottawa Senators annexed the championship prize.

Some 14,000 frenzied dominion fans saw their favorites go down to defeat in the Forum rink. In spite of the setback for the Maroons, the gallery gave the Rangers a big ovation as they carried away the hockey championship in their glorious finish. The Maroons as well were cheered for their showing in the great struggle.

The Rangers jumped into a one-goal lead in the first period when Boucher whipped a sizzling drive into the cage which was too fast for Benedict to stop.

The final session was the most exciting of the game. As in the previous sessions, the Maroons did all the puck-carrying. Boucher broke through a persistent Montreal defense and with only one man between himself and Benedict, outguessed the two of them to clinch the game. With only three minutes of play then remaining, Phillips took a pass from Siebert and succeeded in driving the puck past Miller.

It is predicted that the bait fishing for the trout with salmon eggs etc., will be fairly good in the river, but no good for the fly fishermen, owing to the high and muddy water, and likewise in the smaller mountain streams for the same reason.

The salmon fishing, however, is expected to be good, especially at the Savage Rapids and Gold Ray dams.
