

AL'S CANDIDACY TO BE FORMALLY TOLD TOMORROW

NEW YORK, April 15. — (AP) — George W. O'Ryan, Tammany leader, was on his way north today to attend the meeting tomorrow of the democratic state executive committee at which the presidential candidacy of Governor Smith will be formally launched.

O'Ryan, on his way from a fishing trip in Cuba and Florida, stopped in Asheville, N. C., to discuss politics with Governor Smith, who is spending his vacation there.

Resolutions and speeches summing up Smith's qualifications for the presidency are expected to come from the New York governor a letter expressing his views on national issues.

The executive committee will also select delegates at large to the Houston convention. The New York Times says that seven of the eight delegates have been definitely selected as:

John W. Davis, 1924 presidential nominee; Franklin D. Roosevelt, Smith leader in the 1924 convention; Mayor Walker, Norman E. Mack of Buffalo, Miss Margaret Marbury, member of the national committee; Mrs. Caroline O'Day, vice chairman of the state committee, and Mrs. William H. Good of Brooklyn. Mrs. Henry Morganthau, Jr., has been tentatively selected as the fourth woman on the list.

Barring an upset, the Times says, Senators Copeland and Wagner will not attend the convention as delegates.

ELOPER ON TRIAL AS WIFE KILLER

ASTORIA, Ore., April 15. — (AP) — Trial of George Hannula, 22, on a charge of first degree murder of his wife, Ella, began here today, before Judge George P. Hanley.

Ella Jarvis Hannula was slain early in the morning of February 23 in a hotel belonging to Hannula's mother, where the young couple resided. The inquest disclosed that the slaying followed a party at which Hannula's birthday anniversary was celebrated.

The couple was married a year ago at Kelso following an elopement, where Hannula was attending Oregon State Agriculture college.

Selection of a jury was expected to take up today's session.

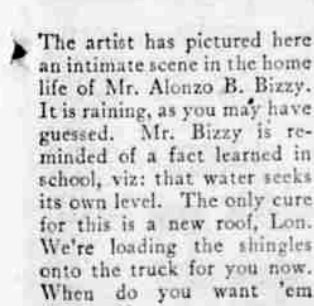

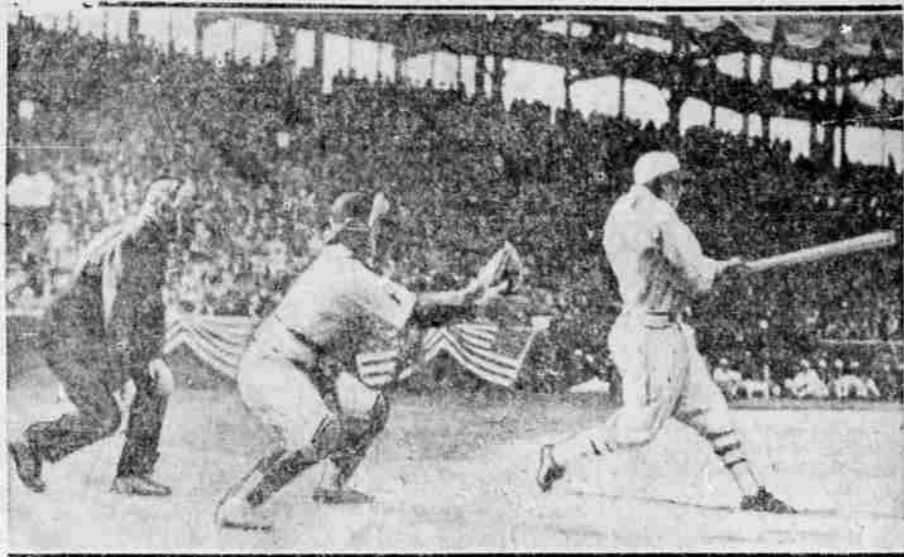

JAP GIRDLER TO SAIL WEDNESDAY IN CIRCLING TRIP

SEATTLE, April 15. — (AP) — On a globe-encircling race via the fastest means of aircraft transportation, Toichiro Araki, a Japanese, was speeding southward to San Francisco today aboard the Southern Pacific crack train, the Cascade Limited.

Racing eastward by boat, train and airplane, Araki is competing against Kiyomichi Matsui, a fellow countryman, in an event sponsored by the Jiji Shimbun, a Tokyo newspaper. Both left the Japanese capital April 6, Matsui starting westward.

Araki reached the American continent yesterday when he landed from the liner Empress of Asia at Victoria, B. C. From there he flew to Seattle, where he stopped a few hours before heading southward. He will fly by commercial air routes from San Francisco to New York, where he is due Wednesday. The same day he is to sail for London and continue to Paris, Berlin, Moscow, Mukden and back to Tokyo. Matsui is following the same route in the opposite direction.

TALKING FILMS FOR COMING CAMPAIGN

NEW YORK, April 15. — (AP) — The people of the United States will now see the figure and hear the voice of the president they elect next November, not only through the moving pictures and the radio, but through talking movies, if plans of the new R. A. C. photo-entertainment announced by David Darnoff, president, are carried through.

Work is being rushed, Darnoff said, to enable theaters throughout the country to present talking movies throughout the campaign showing the candidates in action and presenting their arguments in their own voices.

LOCOMOTIVE KING LIKES CONDITIONS

WASHINGTON, April 15. — (AP) — Samuel Vaucian, president of the Baldwin Locomotive company, said after a call upon President Coolidge today that he was satisfied with business conditions in the country.

Vaucian said that business was only seven per cent below normal and that unemployment was no worse than it usually is at this time of the year.

HUNGARY FLYERS IN STUNT HOPS

BUDAPEST, April 15. — (AP) — Spurred on by the successful flight of the German plane Bremen, Stephen Ribus and Alexander Kutz, widely known Hungarian pilots, have announced their intention of attempting a flight from Budapest to New York in June.

It also was reported that Zoltan Koranyi, another Hungarian pilot, who is a resident of New York, will attempt to fly to Hungary.

Prince Windisch Graetz is the financier of both enterprises.

FRESNO, Cal., April 15. — (AP) — Tomorrow morning at daybreak Jimmie Angel, Fresno aviator, will take off from the municipal airport here on the first lap of an attempted flight around Cape Horn, South America, he announced early this morning. He expects to reach Guaymas, Sonora, Mexico, the first day, he said, where he will pick up a moving picture camera man. Accompanying Angel on the flight will be Fresno Stevenson, vice president of the Deacon Airways, Inc., and Bill Benton, co-pilot and mechanic. Bill Berry is the camera man.

NATIONAL GUARDS TO CAMP, JUNE 13

SALEM, Ore., April 15. — (AP) — Adjutant General George A. White today announced that the annual encampment of the Oregon National Guard will begin Wednesday June 13, continuing the remainder of the month.

Approximately 3000 Oregon Guardsmen will participate this year, all units except the coast artillery to be in training at Camp Clatsop where new buildings have been constructed for their accommodation. The artillery units train at Fort Stevens.

In addition to the National Guard groups a rifle and a machine gun company from Vancouver barracks, aggregating about 150 men, will train at Clatsop. Funds from the war department, totaling about \$200,000 have been received to cover the cost of the encampment.

JEWELERS URGE BAN ON AUCTIONS

It developed within the past week that some of the Medford jewelers will urge the city council in the near future to pass an ordinance to place a ban on jewelry auction sales in the city at any time of the year, and which prohibited jewelry sales at general stores at Christmas times.

At the request of these jewelers it has been learned that City Attorney John H. Carlin has obtained in the near future to pass an ordinance protecting the jewelry stores of that city, which the local jewelers backing the proposed ordinance here may have revamped to fit the local situation.

BULGARIA QUAKE VICTIMS CHILLED

SOFIA, Bulgaria, April 15. — (AP) — With twenty known dead and about 100 persons injured, all available railroad cars today were being sent to the region of southern Bulgaria, which was devastated by an earthquake Saturday, to house the homeless.

Unusually severe cold weather has increased the hardships of the stricken people.

Two thousand houses were destroyed at Tahriran where twelve persons were killed. Eight others were killed in surrounding villages.

NEW BEDFORD, Mass., April 15. — (AP) — Union leaders claimed a 100 per cent effective strike this morning when New Bedford textile operations began their fight against a 10 per cent wage cut. Approximately 30,000 operatives are involved.

Wall Street Report

NEW YORK, April 15. — (AP) — Wall street heard today that Arthur W. Carter of Chicago, has purchased the substantial holdings of Armour "B" stock, estimated at 600,000 shares of the estate of J. Ogden Armour in connection with settlement of the Armour debt to Armour and company. The price is understood to have been \$6.50 per share.

Final adjudication of this debt is expected shortly. Under it Armour and company is expected to receive about \$18,000,000.

RETURN OF NEHF, SOUTHPAW, KEEPS CUBS IN RUNNING

(By Alan J. Gould, Associated Press Sports Editor) NEW YORK, April 15. — (AP) — The bearish movement in Chicago Cub stock that followed the injury to home run Hack Wilson, has been checked by the sensational return to left-handed pitching form of Arthur Nehf.

If the veteran southpaw's exhibition in blanking Cincinnati is any criterion of what may be expected from him this season the Cubs won't have many pitching worries. They already have a sharpshooting corps of right handers, led by Charles Root.

Nehf was a big factor in McGraw's pennant triumphs with the Giants a few years ago, after he had been purchased from the Boston Braves for around \$55,000. The "Yerpe" hand twirler was particularly handy to have around when the Pirates were threatening. He usually had the well-known Indian sign on the buns.

Three years ago Art's arm went back on him and he was shipped to Cincinnati in 1926. He didn't help the Reds a bit and was unconditionally released last year. The Cubs, desperately in need of pitching help, signed the veteran last September. But his record for the last two years shows a grand total of only four victories and seven defeats.

Ever since they sold Alexander "Down the River," the Cubs have been badly in need of an old pitching hand or two for rough pennant weather. Nehf will fill the gap nicely if he keeps on coming back.

Since such stars as Rube Marquard, Nap Rucker, Wilbur Cooper, Jim Vaughn, Hooks Wiltse, Nehf and Rixey have either passed out of the picture completely or at least pushed their prime, the National's left-handed talent has not been much to write home about.

The older circuit hasn't produced any port riders in recent years to match the American League crew that includes such ace as Herb Pennock, Moose Grove, Irvie Walbra, Joe Shautte, Tom Zachary, Earl Whitehill and some up and coming youngsters.

This group is carrying on where Rube Waddell and Eddie Plank left off.

The National has few first class southpaws and Brooklyn has three of them—Pete, Elliott and Clark. Willie Sherrod of the Cardinals is an old reliable and Nehf will help lift the port-side prestige, if he continues the way he started.

The Reds have a capable leftie in Jake May, while the Giants have a youngster of sensational promise in Bill Walker.

The Pirates won the National league flag last year without a southpaw on their roster worth mentioning and are working under the same handicap this season.

ENLARGE HILARITY SEAT CAPACITY

In order to handle a crowd which is expected to be even larger than the record attendance of the Bull Montana and Al Karasick wrestling match ten days ago, work was begun today for the addition of more seating capacity at the Hilarity wrestling pavilion, where next Friday a big double-header wrestling match is to be staged, featuring Stanley Rodgers, the Laidman bone crusher, and Sam Clapham, the British Lion and light-heavyweight champion of Europe.

In addition, Prof. T. Higami, Japanese Jiu Jitsu expert, will meet Frank Burns of Portland in a one-fall finish match, assuring southern Oregon wrestling fans that if action is desired, it will be seen on this card.

Rodgers worked out with Sailor Jack Wood at the pavilion yesterday afternoon before a good sized crowd of spectators, convincing them that he is in perfect condition. He works out regularly every afternoon and invites the general public to witness his preparations for what he expects to be one of his hardest matches of his 15 years experience.
