Another plane left St. Agnes, Que., today for Seven Islands, Que., and a sister ship of the Bremen prepared to leave New York during the afternoon piloted by Fred Melchior, Junkers pilot, and Miss Hertha Junkers, daughter of the German maker of the Bremen.

ST. JOHNS, N. F., April 16.—(AP)—A storm which brought a combination of snow, sleet and rain, prevailed in Newfoundland today. It was considered probable here that similar weather prevailed in the vicinity of Greenly Island and would prevent any attempt today to move the trans-Atlantic plane Bremen from the spot where it landed.

CLARKE CITY, Que., April 16.—(Canadian Press).—A brief description of the flight of the Junkers monoplane Bremen, which made the east-to-west trans-Atlantic flight, was furnished the Canadian Press last night in messages from Blanc Sablon, the nearest wire station to Greenly Island.

Previous to sighting the land the aviators had encountered one difficulty after another. Atmospheric conditions had been unfavorable and the plane was forced to maintain a low altitude. A thick fog came up and the plane entered "darkness."

The messages indicate that at the start of the flight from Balldone, Ireland, weather conditions were favorable. After nearly 30 hours of flying, conditions changed and the Bremen was forced to fly very low. At that time the aviators were confident of success and believed the coast of Newfoundland was at hand.

QUEBEC, April 16.—(AP)—A set of airplane ski runners, capable of being fitted to the trans-Atlantic monoplane Bremen, marooned on Greenly Island, were sent by train to Murray Bay, Que., last night for forwarding to the stranded fliers.

QUEBEC, April 16.—(By the Canadian Press).—A second plane of the Canadian Trans-Continental Airways company left St. Agnes, Quebec, today for Seven Islands, to attempt to obtain news of the trans-Atlantic fliers marooned on Greenly Island.

CONCORD, N. H., April 16.—(AP)—Lieutenant Robert S. Fogg, Concord aviator, took off from the Concord airport today for Quebec on the first leg of a flight to Greenly Island, where the German monoplane Bremen landed after its trans-Atlantic flight.
