FARMERS GUESTS OF ROTARIANS AT MEET THIS NOON

Today was "Farmer's day" at the Medford Rotary club, and the splendid program which was presented proved of great interest to the many business men and agriculturists in attendance. Each Rotarian was supposed to bring a farmer guest and the few who failed to produce a "farmer" found themselves subject to fines.

E. C. Corn, chairman of the program committee, introduced Mr. Harrison, formerly of Santa Rosa, Calif., who has just moved to the Rogue River valley and purchased a ranch where he will raise thoroughbred cattle. He also stated that Mr. Harrison had brought to this valley the finest dairy herd in the history of southern Oregon as a nucleus for his future activities. It is felt that this newcomer will be a decided asset to this community, as he is an expert in his line and has taken hundreds of blue ribbons for his cattle at leading stock shows throughout the country.

Mr. Harrison responded with a short talk in which he gave his reasons for locating here and told of the big possibilities for cattle raising in this locality.

Miss Dorothy Harrison was then introduced and gave a highly instructive talk upon the history of the cow, tracing the ancestry of this noble beast back to the Garden of Eden. She also told of the importance of the cattle industry, outlining the many uses of dairy products, and stated that without the cow, this world would be a sorry place indeed. Miss Harrison's talk was greeted with prolonged applause.

Vernon Vawter presented a comprehensive plan for the securing of a large cannery for the valley, and asked the cooperation of the Rotary club in working up preliminary arrangements. President Allen appointed E. C. Corn to represent the Medford Rotarians on the general committee, a most appropriate selection as very few up-to-date canneries function successfully without "corn."

An impromptu "hog calling" contest was staged during the program. The local Rotary directors being selected to compete for first prize. Jack Carl, Frank Newman, Ed Shockley, Horace Bromley and Bill Bolger were instructed in the art of "pig shouting" by Charlie Hoover, and after a heated contest the judges awarded first honors to Newman, with Shockley a close second. The others "also ran."

Henry Conger was then called in for a real demonstration of this noble profession, and showed the way hogs should be called—and how!
