E. J. Adams, of Eugene, has filed as a candidate for delegate to the Republican national convention to be held at Kansas City in June, from the First congressional district.

Mr. Adams was a delegate to the national convention at Chicago in 1920 and secured the first forest road plank ever written in the national platform. This plank pledged the consideration of the taxable value of the national forests as a controlling factor when considering appropriations for forest roads and trails.

Later he accepted the position of secretary to Senator Stanford and there continued his effort for larger appropriations. Since then Oregon has received over six million dollars, or to be exact, \$6,347,793.00, of Federal money expended on the forest roads of Oregon. Though this fund is shared by eleven States and two territories Oregon receives about one seventh of the total appropriations.

Mr. Adams was also a delegate to the national convention at Cleveland in 1924 and chosen member of the resolutions committee. The chairman named him one of 35 to write and arrange the platform. There he secured three planks in which Oregon is vitally interested. A continuation of Federal aid for highways; larger appropriations for forest roads; and the consideration of potential tonnage in approving projects for the improvement of harbors.

# 'FOOL PROOF' SET PERFECTED FOR AVIATOR'S USE

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Apr. 17.—(AP) Forty seconds by night or two minutes by day, will be all that a trans-oceanic aviator will need to find his position. This was the assertion here yesterday of Lieutenant Commander Phillip V. H. Weems, commander of the naval tanker Cuyama, who has perfected what he believes is a set of navigation instruments for the use of fliers. Plotting a position under ordinary methods takes from 15 to 20 minutes.

During the recent visit of Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh, trans-Atlantic flier, to San Diego, Weems explained his system to the famous aviator and he said Lindbergh declared he wished to learn it at the first opportunity.

Weems disclaimed any credit for discovery. He said he merely condensed and simplified the work of other men although the adjustable position plotting board, used in the system, is his own contrivance and he worked out the concise book of tables that is used in daylight "sun shooting."

**FRESNO AVIATOR TAKES OFF UPON CAPE HORN TOUR**

FRESNO, Cal., April 17.—(AP) Undaunted by an attack of illness, which caused him to spend a sleepless night, Jimmy Angel, gritty Fresno flier, climbed into his Pan-American airplane at sunrise today and hopped off on the first leg of his scheduled 25,000-mile air tour around Cape Horn, South America and return.

Despite its heavy 2800-pound load, the plane made a beautiful take-off, cutting into the air after a short run of less than 300 feet. Circling the Fresno municipal airport and waving a farewell to the handful of Frenos who gathered to bid the flier bon voyage, Angel headed south at a speed estimated at more than 100 miles an hour.

His first scheduled stop is Mexico, where Angel will clear the customs and re-fuel the plane and then take off for Guaymas, Sonora, where he will pick up William Herl, aerial photographer, who will secure a motion picture travelogue and air map pictures of the flight.

Accompanying Angel on the flight from Fresno are Fresno Stephenson, vice-president of the Beacon Airways, Inc., which is backing the Pan-American venture, and Bill Benton of Evanston, Ill., co-pilot and mechanic.
