MILLION LEFT BY DEPEW TO YALE; REMAINDER TO KIN

NEW YORK, April 18.—(AP) A bequest of \$1,000,000 is left to Yale university under the terms of the will of the late Chauncey M. Depew, railroad executive, statesman, humorist and orator, who died April 5. The will was filed today.

Mr. Depew, an alumnus of Yale and a former member of the Yale corporation, made the bequest without restriction as to its use. It was the largest bequest of a total exceeding \$2,200,000.

The value of the estate, which is considerably greater than this, is not yet known. The bulk of the estate is divided among relatives, although servants and the village of Peekskill, N. Y., where Mr. Depew was born, are beneficiaries. Peekskill receives \$100,000 in trust for educational and other public uses.

To his wife, May Palmer Depew, he left in lieu of dower rights, \$200,000 in accordance with an antenuptial agreement made December 27, 1901. She also receives a further bequest of \$150,000, some personal effects and one-half of the residuary estate during life.

The will dated January 26, 1928, directs that his son, Chauncey M. Depew, Jr., receive the great brownstone family home in West 45th street, \$200,000 in cash, one-fourth the residuary estate outright and the income from one-fourth of the estate during his life.
