CHINESE BATTLING CAUSES 2 LANDS TO TAKE ACTION

PEKING, April 20.—(AP) Two nations moved today to protect their subjects in Shantung as the Shantung defense collapsed.

Edwin F. Stanton, American consul, advised his countrymen to leave Tsinan with the nationalists in control of Yenchowfu, 75 miles to the south.

Japan sent three companies of infantry from Tientsin to Tsinan to protect Japanese lives and property in the Shantung province.

The northern armies which are arrayed against the nationalists were driven back on all fronts.

Tsinan, just southwest of Yenchowfu, was also occupied after a northern army of 29,000 men under General Sun Chuan-fang, governor of Shantung, was destroyed by nationalist troops under Feng Yu-hsiang, once known as the Christian general.

General Sun had hoped to cut the Lunghai railway at Kweitan, about 100 miles southwest of Yenchowfu in Honan province. He thus expected to turn the left flank of Chiang Kai-shek, nationalist commander in chief.

TOKYO, April 20.—(AP) The government today issued a statement of its reasons for sending troops into China, recalling that when

Japan withdrew from Shantung last year, China was warned that Japan was ready to take steps and to send a further expedition to protect Japanese lives and property if peace and order in the locality should be disturbed again.

It was emphasized that the present troop movement did not imply unfriendly intent in regard to China or interference in the military operations of either faction.

It was stated that troops would be withdrawn as soon as the danger to Japanese lives and property was past.

TURKEY NOW HAS MANY OLD MAIDS

STAMBOUL, Turkey, April 20.—(AP) The present generation is giving to Turkey its first old maids.

Old maids were unknown in the old days when polygamy and arranged marriages made wives of all Turkish girls, usually when they were still in their teens. The abolition of polygamy, the increased cost of living (estimated to be as high as 2000 per cent) since 1914, the decrease in the number of available husbands, due to the loss of life in Turkey's chain of recent wars, have been factors all tending to produce a decided slump in the marriage market.

The growing economic independence of women also is producing a new type of Turkish bachelor girl, who welcomes spinsterhood as one of the most valuable of her newly discovered opportunities.

SUITS FILED TO RECOVER LOSSES BROKER FAILURE

PORTLAND, Ore., April 20.—(AP) Charging that the New York stock brokerage house of Logan and Bryan had knowledge of the precarious financial condition of Overbeck and Cooke, Portland brokerage house now bankrupt, before the local firm's condition was known to others, J. G. Arnold, Portland attorney, today filed two suits in circuit court against Logan and Bryan, seeking to recover \$3,922.97, which it was charged was due from securities sold by the defendant company.

The suits were brought in behalf of Arthur M. Welch and A. D. Christensen. Both allege that the securities were left with Overbeck and Cooke as guarantees against any advances made by the brokerage house on the purchase of stock. Both plaintiffs charge that at the time the stocks were converted by Overbeck and Cooke through Logan and Bryan, the plaintiffs owed nothing to Overbeck and Cooke or to Logan and Bryan.

Welch seeks to recover \$5,077.97 and Christensen, \$2,342.

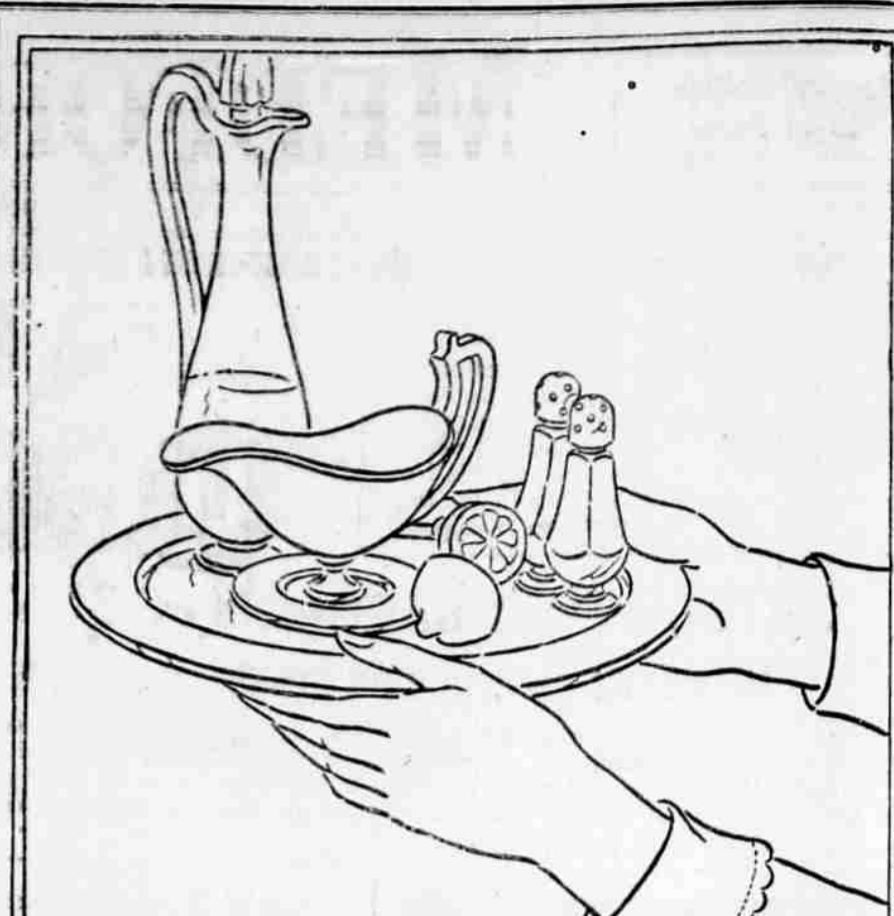
SPECIAL ELECTION URGED BY KOZER TO CHOOSE SOLON

SALEM, Ore., Apr. 20.—(AP) It becomes necessary for Representative N. J. Sinnott of the second Oregon congressional district to resign in order to accept appointment as justice of the court of claims. Secretary of State Koser urges him to do so early enough that Governor Patterson may call a special election for the selection of his successor on May 15, the date of the primary election. This is urged as a matter of economy.

In a telegram to Koser last night, Sinnott asks that Koser confer with the attorney-general and then inform him of the last date on which he may withdraw his name from the republican primary nominating ballot. He says nothing about resigning. But Koser in his reply advises him of what should be done in both cases.

The fact that Sinnott says nothing about resigning may mean, it is believed here, that he will serve out his present term. Should he resign it would be necessary for the congressional committee of the second district to nominate both a candidate to succeed him on the primary ballot and a candidate to compete in a special election with any others nominated to fill his unexpired term. It would be possible, Secretary Koser says, for the same man to be nominated for both.

In his reply to Sinnott, Koser says that a candidate for nomination for any office may withdraw up to the date of the primary election. To simplify matters and make it possible for the congressional committee to name his successor in time to have his name certified to the county clerks and placed on the primary ballot, Koser suggests that the congressman withdraw as soon as possible. In an emergency, however, he says it can be done in four or five days.



SECRETARIAL HEAD OF BANKERS QUILTS

PORTLAND, Ore., April 20.—(AP) Announcement was made this morning by Keith Powell, president of the Oregon Bankers' association, that Andrew Miller has resigned as secretary of the association, to take effect after the convention, which will be held in Gearhart in June. Miller has been active as secretary of the bankers' association ever since coming to Oregon in 1923. During his tenure of office he has brought about many changes in banking practices throughout the state and has been instrumental in proposing numerous bills to the legislature in the interest of better banking.

Although Mr. Miller has made no announcement of his plans, friends believe he has accepted a connection elsewhere and will leave this city after the June convention.

SHOW AT LA GRANDE
