Wall Street Report NEW YORK, April 20.—(AP) The "bull" market which has been under full steam on the New York stock exchange for three months, received a decided setback today on selling inspired by the unexpected increase from four to 4 1/2 per cent in the discount rates of the Chicago and Boston Federal Reserve banks and the unusually large increase of nearly \$125,000,000 in brokers' loans last week. Initial declines in the speculative favorites ranged from 12 to 37 a share as blocks of 1000 to 10000 shares were thrown on the market by panic-stricken speculators for the advance.

POULTRY PRICES A CENT LOWER

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 20.—(AP) Poultry prices were about a cent lower all around today, following several days of large receipts. Good sized broilers were none too plentiful and held steady. Country dressed meats showed little change with the market generally slow. Veal receipts continued heavy and the price weak around 18 to 19 cents. Other classes were notably steady. Butter and egg prices were steady and unchanged today. Yesterday's receipts of butter were 14, 206 pounds and of eggs 5732 cases. Storage holdings were: Butter 11, 773 pounds; eggs 21,794 cases. Wholesale produce prices were generally higher today on local markets caused by the continued rain and cold weather in nearby
