Personal Health Service

RED CHEEKS AND TUBERCULOSIS

Statistics from New York City and New York state, Baltimore, and other places, indicate an alarming increase in the prevalence of tuberculosis among girls from 15 to 20 years of age. There has been a steady decline in the prevalence of tuberculosis among the general population in the last 35 years, a 50 per cent decrease. But at present it would seem that this disease is on the increase among girls.
Rouge and lipstick help to explain it. When a girl learns to use these artifices she just naturally loses interest in the care of her health. What's the use bothering her head about that when she can paint the picture of health on her map and get away with it? Of course along with the rouge goes the habit of wearing French heels, and a girl on such stilts can't do any walking or get any regular daily exercise, and so her appearance is too dreadful without the rouge and lipstick and all the other little make beliefs.
The majority of families nowadays do not even employ a regular family physician, who might give advice about the prevention of disease and the care of health. If a family here and there is still old-fashioned enough to have a family physician, they seldom call on him until there is real trouble, something too serious to be neglected longer. It is a queer streak in human nature that makes people who have a family doctor capricious of rendering good service in dire emergencies, nevertheless send him to a distant place for advice about health, and pay the advertising health stretching corporation two or three times the fee the family doctor would exact for the advice.
Every boy and girl in the teens should have an annual health examination. Every girl 13 to 19 years of age, who seems to be steadily tired, fails to gain weight, falls behind in school work, or is formerly not like that, should be carefully examined with special reference to the question of tuberculosis. The family doctor should make the examination and advise whatever the individual circumstances may indicate. If a doctor is worth anything for anything at all he is competent to render this health service to his patients. This is strictly in his line, and no incorporated nonentity can give you the wisdom and good judgment your private physician uses in such service. If you want a lot of hokey, pamphlets, uplift letters and so on, write off to the health stretching corporation for it. If you want sound medical or health advice, consult your physician.
When a girl is training for tuberculosis she finds it easy to "reduce": in fact her figure is likely to become slender in spite of her chronic fatigue to the fact that she is out so much nights and gets so little sleep. That is partly true, but it doesn't quite explain the increasing anemia that she conceals by heavier applications of rouge, nor does it account for the funny little cough she can't suppress.
This is idle talk, so far as the girl herself is concerned. It will never touch her at all. But I hope it may arouse a few mothers to the realization of the danger. I appeal to teachers to bear in mind the adage about sound mind and sound body. I urge employers who prohibit smoking in business hours to prohibit rouge, lipstick and formal evening dress in business hours.

Answer.—If catnip tea were the worst thing a mother ever gave her baby for colic I'd yell three cheers for her. But country mothers, in my experience, are even more credulous about store dope than city mothers are, and so the country baby suffers rather more from the false charge of colic than the city bimbo does. I believe catnip has some mild sedative action, and it never does any harm.
