D. A. R. REFUSE TO FLAY BLACKLIST; AUTHOR IS KNOWN

WASHINGTON, April 20.—(AP)—Moving swiftly against its insurgent element, the Daughters of the American Revolution in convention today almost unanimously defeated three protesting resolutions including one aimed against the much-talked-about blacklist.

The resolutions incorporating the protests of the group led by Mrs. Helen Tufts Ballie of Boston, a foe of the blacklist, sought to have the chapters select speakers without interference with the national organization, an accounting from the committee on national defense of its views on naval building and approval by the chapters of any national policy before it was enunciated by the society.

Only a dozen scattering delegates rose when the question was put to a vote. A short time before the committee on resolutions had reported the resolutions to the floor of the convention without recommendation. Mrs. Ballie had appeared there with a photostatic copy of a letter written by President Coolidge to an officer of the Ford Hall forum of Boston, commending the work of this institution which was declared by Mrs. Ballie to have been blacklisted by the Massachusetts branch of the D. A. R.

WASHINGTON, April 20.—(AP)—Mrs. Helen Tufts Ballie of Boston declared in a statement today that the famous Massachusetts blacklist which is disturbing the Daughters of the American Revolution was prepared by a woman not a member of the organization.

Mrs. Randolph Frothingham, Stephen M. Hurd, state vice regent and chairman for national defense of the Massachusetts D. A. R. circulated it throughout the chapters. Mrs. J. C. Preddy, Massachusetts regent and Mrs. Hurd refused to comment.
