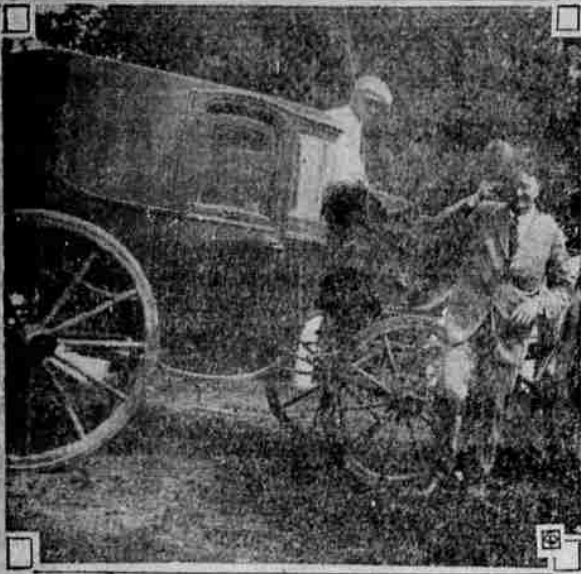


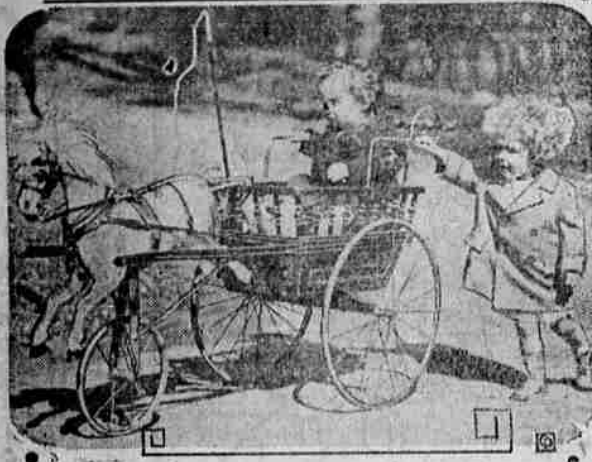

## CONGRESSMAN UNEARTH'S RELIC



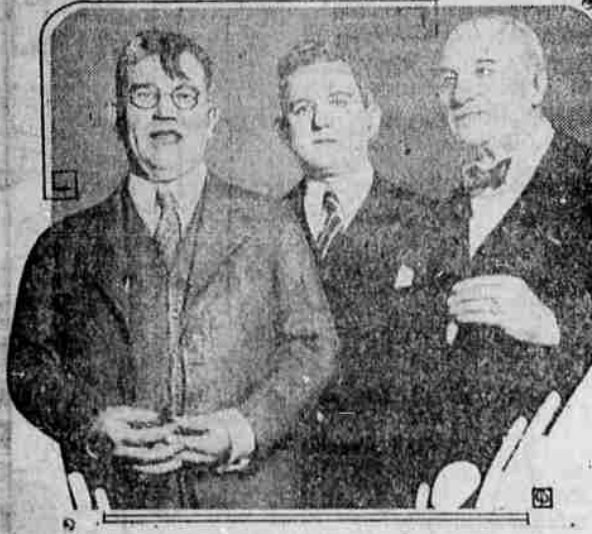

## A CAMPAIGN PARADE FOR GRANDPA



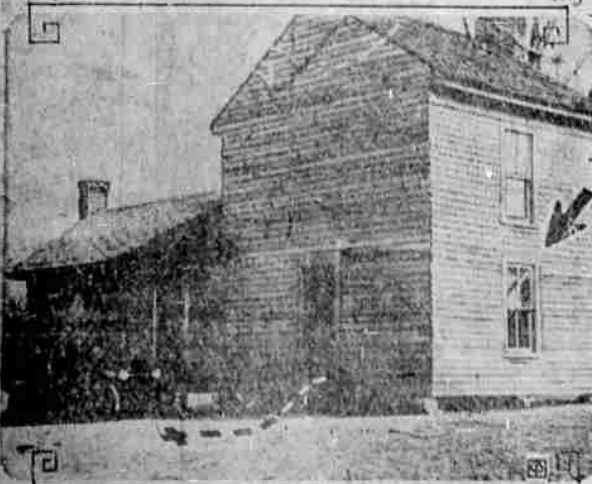

A car near the house was cut up, chickens killed, and a horse injured by the slayer.
